Cottage Grove has updated its Historic Preservation Refinement Plan, replacing its 2014 iteration as the city's guiding document for community engagement, grant writing and partnership projects regarding historic preservation over the

next five years. The city council voted Sept. 9 to amend the city's Comprehensive Plan in order to incorporate the updated Historic Preservation Refinement Plan. The 108-page document focuses on longrange management of Cottage Grove's cultural heritage by seeking to maintain the city's historic character.
