heritage-related programs.

The projected Lottery Fund allocation is down 30 percent from pre-coronavirus estimates. The state park system was closed for two months, and is just now starting to offer limited services to campers.

When it became clear in spring that revenues were going to be unstable, OPRD froze hiring, curtailed discretionary spending, and suspended large improvement and repair projects and other programs such as

The current estimated \$22 million gap could grow or shrink, but it has necessitated the decision to lay off 47 positions by June 30. The number of positions laid off could change; state park field operations have borne the lion's share of the workforce reduction already.

Most of the state park workforce is hired seasonally, and of the 415 positions allotted to operate parks, only 77 had been hired by the time the system closed in March.

Some seasonal staff may be hired on a case-by-case basis to flesh out the current skeleton crew. The upcoming reductions will focus on other areas of the department.

Typical services such as trash collection, restrooms, and showers are limited, both due to their expense and the limited staffing. Fewer staff and funds are available for landscape maintenance and cleanup, a point driven home by storm damage in central Oregon this past weekend.

Given the uncertainties of staffing and public health considerations reservation services will resume, but in a likewise limited manner.

Reservations are now accepted online at https://oregonstate parks.reserveamerica.com/ and by phone at 800-452-5687.

New reservations will be accepted one day to two weeks in advance only, instead of one day to nine months in advance, which had been in place for years.

Not all sites at all parks are available, and many were already reserved before the system closed. No walk-in or first-come, firstserved camping will be available on the coast until further notice.

Visitors can help by treating park properties gently, using as little water and power as necessary, and packing out trash.

"This is a heartbreaking

fox as a pup and took it in about a year ago. Wildlife managers learned of the incident, a warrant was served and the fox was turned over.

The woman was criminally cited for Unlawful Take/ Hold Wildlife: Red Fox, a class A Misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of \$6,250 and/or one year in jail.

The red fox is in good hands at Wildlife Safari, but will still live the rest of its life in captivity after losing the chance to learn survival skills from its mother in the wild where it belongs.

Follow these tips if you encounter young animals in the wild:

- · Never assume an animal is orphaned. Don't remove it from the forest, including your backyard.
- Call your local ODFW office, Oregon State Police office, or a local licensed wildlife rehabilitation center for advice and follow it when: 1) you see an animal that you know is orphaned because you observed the dead parent animal, or 2) the parent hasn't returned after constant and discrete observation for a long time (up to a day), or 3) if the animal is clearly injured or
- Keep your dog or cat away from young wildlife, especially in the spring.

ficult choices between rent, mortgage, medication, food and other necessities," said Wilson.

"Senior Meals fills that gap so that seniors are taken care of," Wilson said of the program that provides meal delivery to anyone and their spouse 60 and older, regardless of income. "And it's not just the meal. It's the companionship, the friendship and we're also doing wellness checks when we drop off food at someone's

Despite difficulties caused by virus concerns, LCOG has not stopped providing food to the community and the upcoming Race for the Rest of Us is indicative of their continued efforts to support the Senior Meals Program.

"We wanted to find a fundraiser than anyone and everyone could participate in," Wilson said. "Whether you're a child, or a senior, or you're experiencing a disability, whatever. Our main offices are in Eugene and we're Track Town USA, so I thought, 'How do I capture the energy that comes with that to find a way for us to raise additional funds for senior meals?' and I wanted it to be something that was healthy for people."

While most races - for fundraising purposes or otherwise - challenge athletes to complete five, 10 or 20 kilometers, the Race for the Rest of Us comes in at a tidy 0.5K, making it accessible to all.

Participants who sign can complete the race any time between July 22 and July 26 and will receive a packet including a t-shirt, a finisher's medal and 0.5K bumper sticker. Wilson also stresses that runners can join the virtual event no matter where in the world they are.

"Anyone can do it anywhere and by anywhere, I mean anywhere. You can do this in London because we'll mail your packet to you."
