ing to really get their hearts pumping. Oh, there's also scenic bikeways and other magnificent road cycling options to see miles and miles of Lane County. For an organized ride be sure to check out the Oregon Gran Fondo and group rides are available through Greater Eugene Area Riders (G.E.A.R.S.). Eugene-Springfield's extensive paved paths offer views of the Willamette River, provide access to area parks and connect to natural areas where exploration can be expanded

to catching butterflies, turtle viewing and birding. Cottage Grove's Row River National Recreation Trail is a one of Oregon's designated scenic bikeways. The Covered Bridges Scenic Bikeway is an amazing path that runs from downtown Cottage Grove to Dorena Reservoir and, as its name suggests, provides access to several of Oregon's historic covered bridges. Get some exercise, stop for picnic and experience some of Lane County's history. **Running** — As the birthplace of recreational running, Eugene has led the way in offering paved paths and bark trails (Pre's Trail

& Adidas Oregon Trail), to get out and enjoy these sunny days. But our region is flush with trail running opportunities that include nearby nature trails like the Ridgeline Trail and Mount Pisgah. This time of year would typically include many choices to participate in organized road runs, but COVID-19 put a damper on these community gatherings. Fortunately our area sports event planners are finding ways to offer limited opportunities. The Scandia Run offers a group event in Junction City in August, while you can choose your own route and time to run in a virtual run like

the Eugene Emeralds Big Foot Run. **Overnight It** — Make your day trip and overnigher. Travel Lane County's lodging partners are offering staycation packages that will stretch your budget. Commission also amended regulations for commercial coastal pelagic species (Pacific sardine) to be consistent with federal guidelines. These regulations will continue the commercial fishing closure that began in July 2015 due to a large decline in Pacific sardine biomass, but a few small scale, limited sardine fisheries will continue. In a discussion of other business, Commissioners further discussed the scope of the review of trap check regulations and on beaver management in Oregon they initiated last month. More discussion about the scope of the review and the individuals involved is planned for the coming months. Finally, the Commission approved ODFW's proposed 2021-23 Agency Request Budget with some minor adjustments. They strongly endorsed ODFW's planned creation of a Habitat Division to have specific responsibility for habitat and strengthen ODFW's commitment to habitat restoration and improvement. The budget does not include any fee increases on sport or commercial licenses in this budget cycle. While 2021 would typically be a year to raise fees to take effect in 2022 (because the department adjusts fees every six years), ODFW is pleased to be in a position to delay this and not request any fee increase of hunters, anglers or commercial fishermen until 2024 at the earliest. The budget will now go to the Governor and then the 2021 Legislature for final approval.

to participate in their school's extra-curricular activities. In addition to ODE's square footage requirement, the department is also asking schools to place a strong emphasis on hand hygiene once students return, restrict non-essential visitors and provide routine cleaning and sanitizing of classrooms. It's that final point that may be one of the largest day-to-day changes for everyone involved. "I've talked with [classroom staff] and told them, 'You know, you guys are going to have to become custodians too.' That's the only way we're going to be able to pull this off," Berry said of what will be a near-constant need to keep school areas sanitized. But, classroom staff will likely not be alone in their new duties. "I think the cleaning piece, at the elementary level teachers teach that more than at the high school level. The high schoolers are going to be in for a rude awakening because that stuff has to happen and we don't have the money to hire new custodians. We just don't. I wish we did." Within YSD's reopening plan, the district also wants to remind staff,

students and parents that bussing will still be available on normal routes with one student per seat; meals will still be served, though students will eat in their classrooms; recess will be done in cohort groups; all field trips are canceled; and athletic events remain up in the air as they are dependent on further ODE and OSAA guidance. As Berry stated — and as the nation as a whole has seen — plans in the climate of COVID-19 are always subject to change. As August approaches, there may still end up being more questions than answers, but Berry and YSD are adamant about doing whatever's necessary to place health, safety and comfort at the top of their priorities. "The trust level is going up in the school district," Berry said. "[Going back] is the parents call. If they don't feel like it's safe for their kids to be in that building, then I don't want them there. I want to work with them however I can to keep them on track ... but we're doing the best we can with the information we have to work with." North Douglas, Elkton and South Lane School Districts could not be reached for comment before press time regarding their reopening plans and/or changes.

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
