
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Lane County placed on state's coronavirus 'Watch List'

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On Oct. 16, Oregon Gov. Kate Brown placed Lane County on the state's COVID-19 watch list for the first time following a two-week increase in confirmed or suspected cases in the county.

Benton, Clatsop, Malheur and Umatilla counties are also currently on the list.

According to Brown, presence on the watch list does not indicate that the county is being moved back to Phase I and is only a precautionary measure intended to help policymakers and COVID-19 response teams to prioritize resources and assistance to counties that are seeing the broadest spread of

Counties are placed on the watch list when there is a "sporadic case" rate of 50 or more per 100,000 in the preceding two weeks and the county has more than 5 sporadic cases in the same timeframe.

Sporadic cases are those which cannot be traced to a source, indicating community spread.

SLSD delays implementing hybrid model

Due to the recent rise in COVID-19 infection and test positivity rates in Lane County and in the State of Oregon, South Lane School District (SLSD) has announced it will not begin its in-person hybrid model which had originally been scheduled to start on Nov. 2.

"We look forward to bringing all students back into our buildings when county and state metrics allow us to do so," announced the district in a newsletter. "For now, we will continue in distance learning. We will keep you updated about a potential start date for hybrid learning in our weekly newsletter for staff and families (The South Lane Connection Download)."

The Oregon Department of Education allows an exemption for K-3 students to attend in-person classes providing certain metrics are met. Lane County surpassed those metrics during the week of Sept. 13.

To return to in-person instruction, school districts must be in a county that meets certain criteria.
