REBELS DRIVEN TO FIGHT.

American Troops Advance Like a Whirlwind.

MANILA, March 29.—The insurgents have lost faith in Aguinaldo, and he, with his family, are preparing to fly from Manila.

The advance of the Americans from Maricao has been like a whirlwind. The troops have never wavered.

Aguinaldo, commander of the insurgents and for the first time the Filipinos advanced to meet the Americans. The Americans reserved their fire till the enemy was within 400 yards. The entire line fired at the same time. They fled in confusion.

Prisoners captured say the officers used whips on the men to make them fight and the bodies of dead Filipinos are covered with wounds. Aguinaldo is putting to death all who refuse to fight or want to run away.

A big battle is imminent. The insurgents have murdered many Chinese. If the rebels refuse to fight at Manila the war may be prolonged indefinitely. The rebel loss in the forward march is estimated at 3000.

The Oregon wounded will be brought home as soon as possible from Manila. As there are plenty of transports there, the wounded men can come home at an early date. Those able to travel will be immediately put on board.

In due time the Oregon dead will be brought home also, as it is the policy of the department to bring the remains of the soldiers to the United States, when such requests are made.

The Roseburg Plaindealer sarcastically remarks that "The populist party is still strong enough in the United States senate to make a motion, but not to get a second to it."

All along the line word comes that Oregon is bound to receive an immense immigration this coming year. Does Cottage Grove want any of these homeseekers? If so wouldn't it be a pretty good idea to look into the matter a little?

An interesting story is printed about the excellent meals that are cooked for our soldiers in Luzon, even up to the firing line. This is a remarkable contrast to the miseries and incompetence of the campaign in Cuba. The war department is learning by experience. So are all connected with the operations there. The news reports, for example, are vastly more intelligent and satisfactory than those that used to come from Havana and Santiago. Yet some of our European critics will have it that we are slow to learn.—Oregonian.

Oregon is a large state, but it glows throughout all its boundaries with the luster which the warship of its name sheds upon it. It is the proudest craft afloat on any sea. Now that it has dropped anchor in Manila harbor we may look for the speedy advent there of white-winged peace descending dove-like on the isles. Even the Anakim or Sons of Thunder would not fight when such armaments to any extent required could be sent against them. The insurrectionists certainly will not, and we may reasonably expect to hear of their capitulation any day, entitling the Oregon to the same renown as a peacemaker that she has already won in the opposite direction.—Oregonian.
