

Another Train Accident.—

At the Divide, south of this place Monday afternoon. Mrs. J. L. McKinney of this city, while riding on the S. P. freight train received a compound fracture of a rib. It appears that the long freight train parted, and when the front section slowed up the rear section crashed into it, throwing the passengers violently with the above result. It will be some time in May therefore before Sheriff Withers will perform the unpleasant duty required by law and in the name of justice.—Guard.
