The Guard, commenting upon the large delinquent tax list of Multnomah county, published in last Monday's Oregonian, says that the issue of the Oregonian "will turn immigration to other sections if sent out extensively." If the Guard has the circulation that it claims it has—or even the half of it—it simply adds to the alleged harm that Monday morning's Oregonian will do, "if sent out extensively."

If there is any harm and damage done to the state by the publication and circulation of the Multnomah county delinquent tax list, the comments of the Guard, will not help the matter any. However, when the people stop to think that the beginning of the troubles of the tax payers of Multnomah county, as well as all the other counties, not only in Oregon but in the several states, commenced and grew to their most extended proportions, under a prosperous (?) democratic administration, which everybody knows came near bankrupting the government, and that today the tax payer is squaring his delinquent tax account of that democratic administration under a good old-fashioned republican administration, they are not inclined to feel greatly exercised over the Guard's calamity howl. About the only thing that hurts the Guard is the fact that Lane county's delinquent tax list isn't as large as that of Multnomah county. The Guard publishes the delinquent list of this county this year. This is the extent of the Guard's interest in the tax payer of the common wealth.

In the account of the tragic death of Game Warden McGuire and Senator Al Reed, it is chronicled that the boat had been worked in close to shore and that Mr. Reed caught hold of some willows on the bank and tried to draw the boat in to the bank. The current was too strong however and he let go. Right here is where the nobleness and generosity of the man is presented. Mr. Reed knew that death stared them in the face and that with the unmanageable boat if they went into the whirling rapids they were sure to be drowned. It would have been an easy and safe thing for Mr. Reed to have clung to the willows and jumped from the boat when he discovered that he could not hold the entire party, and he then could have easily pulled himself ashore. But rather than desert his companions for his own safety, he preferred to take his chances with them and go down the stream in safety or to death. Even in this he was generous to a fault.

The Roseburg Review of the 10th inst published a memorial souvenir of Senator A. W. Reed, who was drowned in the Umpqua on April 8. If one had never seen, nor talked, nor transacted business with Senator Reed, one would know by his manly countenance as pictured in the cut of the Review that he was all that the people say he was: generous, noble, kind and at all times a faithful friend. The hearts of the people not only of his own country but of the state go out to the bereaved wife.

The Daily Oregonian of Monday April 10, consisted of thirty-six pages, twenty-two and one half of which were devoted to the delinquent tax roll of Multnomah county.

It fell to Michigan to lead out in republican state conventions this year, and she has done so with honor to herself and to the republican party. The convention declared itself in favor of the gold standard and opposed to the coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1. Of course, this silver proposition was settled quite satisfactorily to the masses of the people of the United States at the last presidential election.

In the death of Hon. H. D. McGuire who was drowned in the Umpqua river last Saturday, the state sustains the loss of one of its most painstaking and efficient officers. As Game and fish warden of the state, Mr. McGuire was always to be found closely in touch with his duties and ever on the progressive march to advance the interests of the state in relation to his office. As a man he was well liked and widely known. His place as an officer of the state will be hard to fill, and as a man he is mourned by hundreds of friends.

Mayor, Darwin Brinow; councilmen, 1st ward, G. H. Stone, W. S. Bennett; 2nd ward, B. Larch and W. S. Christman; 3rd ward, Geo. Hawley and Wm. Cumming; treasurer, Herbert Eakin; recorder, J. S. Medley; marshal, J. W. Miller.

After the reading of the minutes of last meeting, which were approved, committee appointed to examine retiring treasurer's report, reported that the same was in such shape that it was impossible to make any report upon the same.

On motion the liquor license was fixed at \$400 for the ensuing year, license to be issued semi-annually if desired.

On motion the bonds of the treasurer were fixed at \$1000 and those of the recorder at \$500.

Marshal was instructed to notify all owners of property to clear up the streets and alleys adjacent to their premises, also all vacant lots.

On motion council adjourned to meet at 8 o'clock p. m. Tuesday April 11, 1893.

Moved and seconded that the bond of F. L. Jones for liquor license be approved. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the bond of F. W. Blew for liquor license be approved. Carried.

Mr. Walker of the Exchange saloon, owing to illness having neglected to prepare his bond, and so reporting, asking that he be given until tomorrow (April 12) to prepare the same, a committee was appointed consisting of W. S. Christman, Wm. Cumming and Geo. Hawley, to receive or reject the same.
