The G. A. R. state encampment while in session at McMinnville last week transacted the following business.

Officers elected: council of administration—T. J. Fryer, Independence; W. E. Copeland, Salem; Geo. A. Harding, Salem; B. F. Pike, Wasco; J. A. Burlingame, Eugene.

Delegates to national encampment, A. W. France, Oregon City; A. P. Gard-broad, Grant; A. C. Sloan, Portland.

The adjutant general's report shows 52 posts in the department, with a membership of 1827 in good standing. The amount expended for relief during the year is \$2518.24 and by the Womens Relief Corps, \$1265.92.

Resolutions in protest of the reduction of the annual state appropriation were submitted and adopted also a resolution commending the efficient administration of the soldiers home.
