

Uncle Sam Will be in Port-

land.— Frank S. Colburn, familiarly known from one coast to the other as "Uncle Sam" or the "Yankee Tourist," was in Cottage Grove Thursday. Mr. Colburn is a very good likeness of our national "Uncle Sam," and answers to that appellation. In September 1896 he started from the East on a walking tour around the world. He visited all the important points in the Atlantic and Southern States and reached San Francisco, California, about the time President McKinley passed the "volunteers." He enlisted in Battery "B," California Heavy Artillery. The battery did not get into active service much to Uncle Sam's disappointment, and after nine months garrison duty, he was mustered out of service on Angel Island. After some weeks stay he started north on his tour through California and Oregon, and is hitting the high places just now with the view of getting to Portland in time to meet the boys. Mr. Colburn is "doing the north" on foot and expects to terminate his tour in Paris in time to see the great exposition. He collects business cards and files them in a mammoth scrap book, and will write a book upon his travels upon the completion of his tour. In connection with this book will be a list of all the different business houses which have provided him with cards, making a valuable directory. He goes his own way, is perfectly independent, but collects a small amount from each business house desiring that their business shall be represented in his scrap book. He speaks in glowing terms of the hospitality showed him throughout his trip, especially on this coast. Of the coast he says: "Northern California for scenery, Oregon for farming industries." However it might be well to suggest that he has not as yet gazed upon Columbia river scenery. He is a pleasant, unassuming gentleman, and has the advantage of seeing more than the ordinary newspaperman.
