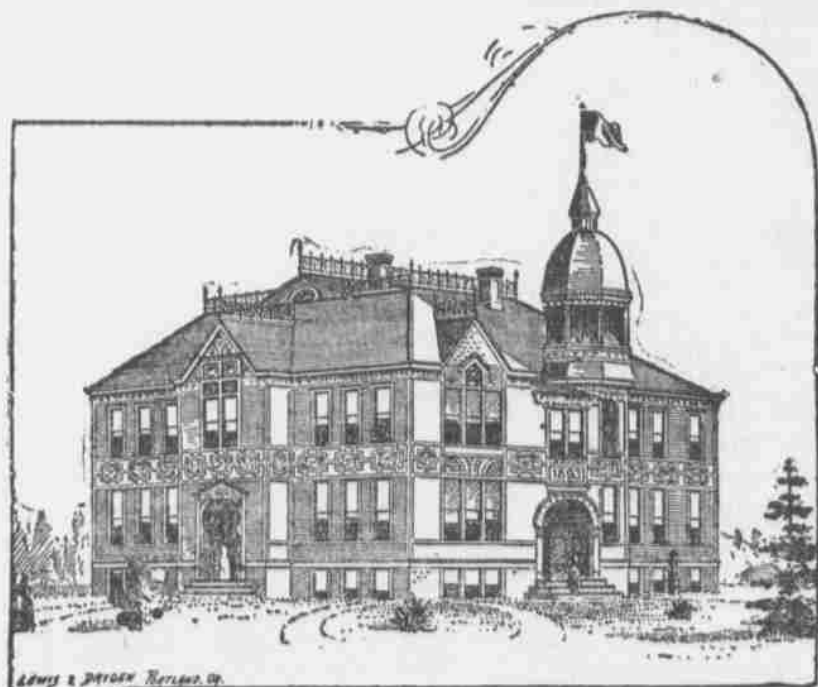

part of the common stock of knowledge. It will usually run well up into the millions, but that only tells a part of the story. There is no insurance on the forests; and even if there were, it would be valueless with respect to the main point of loss. We are being deprived of that which it takes years—perhaps a century—to reproduce, and in the meantime we are losing the influences of that beneficent part which the forests take in nature's beautiful economy. Here is certainly an object lesson for the new Cornell school of forestry. Fires constitute one of the greatest problems with which we have to deal. It will not answer to say that they cannot be foreseen or prevented. Germany permits no such wholesale ruin in her splendid forests, simply because she employs an effective system of watchfulness and protection. Even under our more elastic form of government, we ought to be able to do in this respect what Germany can do. Indeed, the time is fast approaching when, whatever the cost, we cannot afford not to.

## TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES.

The Boston Transcript makes a suggestion that is worthy of the most serious consideration. Speaking of the forest fires that are raging through five counties of Northern New York, constituting almost a national calamity, inasmuch as 20,000 acres of heavy timber growth have been despoiled the Transcript says there is something concerning which general statistics give us little light. We are informed, approximately, each year, what the fire loss of the country has been. But that information deals only with buildings and their contents, something that the hand of man has produced and the hand of man, aided by the insurance companies, can replace. But the loss by forest fires each year is not even approximately a
