"If I ever try to be funny again hope someone will kick me!"

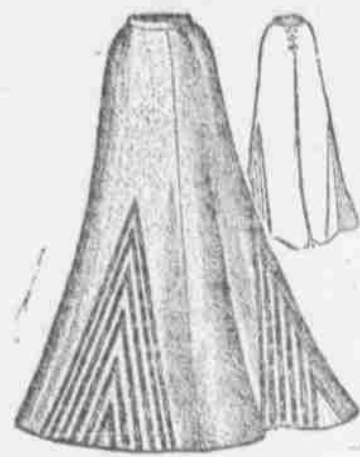
