Mrs. Stoneburg of the Grove was visiting her daughter Mrs. Coffman last Sunday.

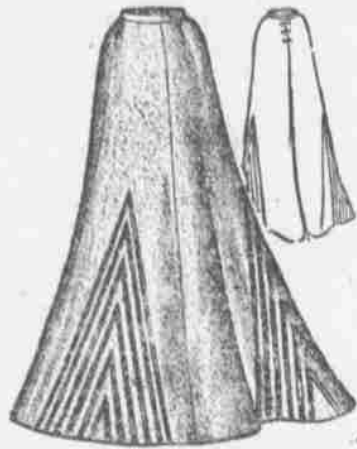
Jim Hawley called on friends in this vicinity Saturday before leaving for Southern California to spend the winter.
