The republican pot seems to be simmering in a very harmonious manner just now, there being little opposition for nominations, except for the offices of sheriff and treasurer, and in this the best of harmony exists, each candidate feeling it his plain duty to abide by the vote of the nominating convention. This is as it should be and every voter as well as candidate for nomination should take it upon himself to stay by the choice of the convention, not in one instance but in each and every one. This is good politics, and its a sure winner. Hon. A. C. Jennings is highly spoken of for county judge. Scott, Page and Hawley are possible candidates for the office of sheriff. Dick Burton for assessor is again talked of. For treasurer, J. T. Rowland, Geo. F. Craw, of Eugene, M. Gilstrap of Springfield, and Mr. Hill of Richardson precinct, are mentioned. The office of county school superintendent has three takers, Professors Hunt, Orton and W. W. Allingham. Messrs. Robt. Huston, E. F. Chapman of Eugene and Jas. Hemenway of Cottage Grove are said to be on the tapis for representative honors. Hon. S. H. Friendly of Eugene and Hon. L. S. Moorhead of Junction City are mentioned for joint senator. They are both good men and should either receive the nomination and election, they would make a record of which their constituency would be proud.

When ever a new law goes into effect, there is apt to be more or less misconstruction and misunderstanding of it. It is quite possible that when the vote of the state is counted it will be demonstrated that considerable misunderstanding regarding the register law, has prevailed, not only with the voters but also with the various registers appointed throughout the county. C. Woodcock should be that man.

Advices from Cottage Grove indicate that the republicans in that section will send a delegation to the county convention strongly supporting James Hemenway as a candidate for representative to the legislature.—Eugene Register.

S. L. Moorhead of the Junction City Times has been mentioned as a possible candidate for joint senator for Lane. Mr. Moorhead is an able editor, and that is pretty good evidence that he would be an able senator. Of course the Nugget man will throw all the votes he gets to Moorhead.
