

**Central Committee Meeting.**

The following is extracted from the Register's report of the republican central committee meeting held in Eugene last Saturday. H. F. McCormack in the chair, Prof. E. E. Orton temporary secretary. Secretary called the roll of precincts and all vacancies were filled. Owing to the change in precinct boundaries discussion arose regarding the representation at the county convention. On motion by Moorhead the basis of representation was made on the vote cast of Gov. T. T. Geer, and that there be one delegate at large and one for each fifteen votes or fraction of eight in each precinct. On this basis the county convention will be entitled to 184 delegates. On motion a committee of five was appointed to ascertain the number of delegates from each precinct, to be published at an early date as possible. It was also moved that the committee be empowered to determine date of holding the convention and primaries. J. W. Cook represented Bohemia, also proxy for J. W. Cropper, W. Cottage Grove; O. F. Knox, E. Cottage Grove; W. W. Scott, Creswell; J. G. Powell, Wallace.

**G. A. R. And Circle.**

Circle, the membership of which is composed of wives, daughters and sons of soldiers of the civil war. The visit terminated in the successful organization of a circle with a substantial membership.
