Uncle Harry Kincaid's Stat Journal makes a great howl about the legal notices for publication being published in republican papers, insinuating that no matter how viciously the officials of the present administration shall be attacked by anti-republican papers that the patronage of the land office should be equally divided, basing his assertion upon the grounds that "When the democrats had the land office at Roseburg they divided the land notices about equally between the republican and democratic papers." The State Journal (Uncle Harry's paper) a republican paper, received about as much land office advertising as the Guard, a democratic paper. It is hardly necessary to dispute Mr. Kincaid, because he is wise and learned in all things, but it is more than probable that his memory failed him in this particular. No republican received any patronage from the Roseburg Land Office under the democratic administration in question, unless the democratic administration had some pull on it. If the State Journal received an equal amount of advertising from the Roseburg Land Office at that time, the officials either had or thought they had some pull upon Uncle Harry's sheet, and events happening later on, occasion one to believe that the democratic administration of which the venerable editor of the Journal speaks so patronizingly, had a long string from the land office hitched to the Journal's editorial desk. It would be interesting to know how many other republican papers received an equal share of the land office publications. The Register was a republican paper at the time the land office affairs were in the hands of the democrats but it didn't get any of the democratic swag. The trouble with the very able editorial writer of the Journal is that he is on the fence and while there he can't cut a slice of public patronage, and he has placed himself in such a peculiar situation that it is hardly safe for him to get down on either side. Again the aged editorial brother was feasted at the public crib for four long years, and he should not feel cut up over a little falling off of public patronage.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTIONS.

The committee appointed to set the date of meeting for the County Republican Convention and to make the apportionment of delegates have reported. The county convention will be held on April 4, 1900, and the date of primaries is set for March 26, 1900. East Cottage Grove is entitled to 8 delegates; West Cottage Grove 6; Bohemia 2; Saginaw 5; Wallace 1; Creswell 6.

STATE CONVENTION CALL.

The republican state convention for Oregon will be held in Portland on Thursday April 12 1900 at 10 o'clock a m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for presidential electors, state and district officers, except congressmen, and for the election of four delegates at large to the national republican convention, and for the transaction of other business coming before the convention. The Convention will consist of 335 delegates.

CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION.

The republican congressional convention for the 1st district will be held at McMinnville Tuesday April 10. The second congressional convention will be held in Portland April 13.
