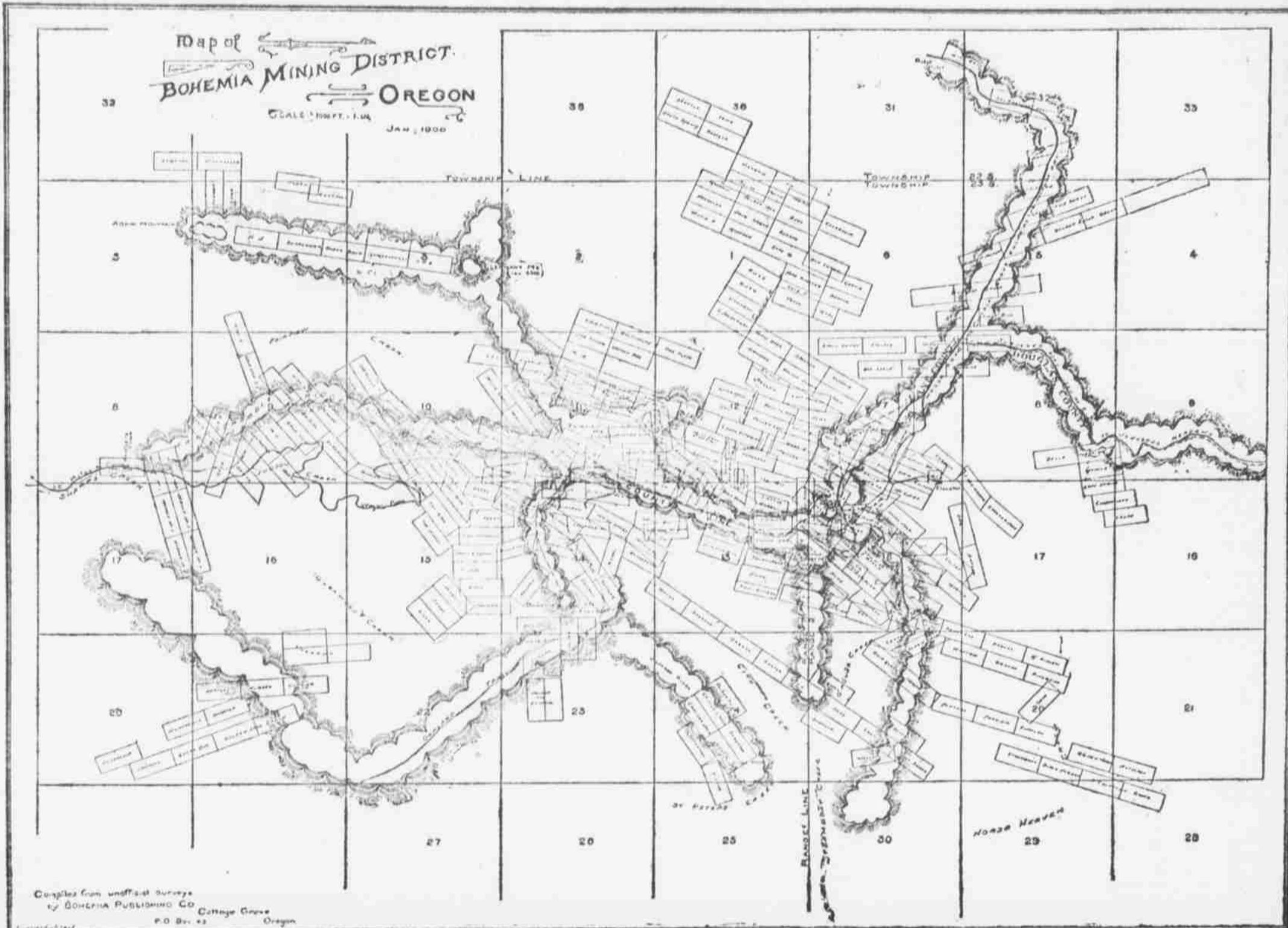

## MINES AND MINING.

Devoted to Bohemia Notes and Mining Items of General Interest to Mining Men.

The Musick mine after a successful run of eight months shut down this week. The reason for the shut down is the lack of wood. The company has hundreds of cord wood cut on their property, but owing to the great amount of work laid off the company failed to get sufficient wood to the mill to run the year around, and at this season of the year it is almost an impossibility to haul. However as soon as teams can be used to advantage, the mill will be put to work again. It is said the cleanups have netted a handsome dividend to the owners this season.

It is said that "Billy" Masterson, of the Nappanee group has struck some excellent rock on the Monarch claim recently.

A splendid streak of ore running \$80 to the ton was recently struck at the Mayflower, owned by Perry Ely, on the Yreka ledge.

Advices to the effect that while it will be necessary to shut down the Musick owing to the shortage of wood at the mill, the shut down will be only temporary. P. J. Jennings who is acting superintendent during the absence of Superintendent I. H. Bingham who is at present in Paris, France, arrived Wednesday and is making arrangements to have teams immediately employed at wood hauling. In the mean time it is said that the miners will be kept at work, adding to the already large amount of ore on the dump.
