There are few men in railroad circles who take the interest in pointing out to the producers of the state many interesting facts beneficial to the farmer and stock raiser that Mr. C. H. Markham, general passenger and freight agent of the Southern Pacific Co., does. He furnishes from time to time authentic figures from data compiled in the offices of the company that cannot help but be of interest to producers. Among other things he has this which will probably make those who haven't a very good opinion of the poultry business open their eyes: The Southern Pacific Company last year hauled over 224 car loads of poultry from Kansas and Nebraska to California. The rate from Kansas is \$1.75 per 100. The average number of chickens in a car is 4,000, which brings the average price to 3cts per pound or \$1.44 a dozen for the average chicken, and as the northwest can raise chickens so easily there is no reason why these hundreds of car loads that go into California markets should not come from this section. It is time to say that the chicken business is overdone, or that it does not pay, when we have succeeded in supplying all the wants of ourselves and our neighbor state.

They went about their business as though Bryan was a thing of the past and he rolled on southward without saying any part of his little free silver speech. "Straws show which way the wind blows."

South Lane county was splendidly recognized in the county convention, the delegation from here getting all they asked for. However the fact that Cottage Grove is the home of the nominee on the republican ticket for county judge and a representative does not argue that this section will receive greater consideration in the event these candidates are elected, than any other section of the county. In the matter of judge, the choice fell to this section purely upon the merits of the man. Mr. Knox is known to a considerable extent throughout the county and especially in Eugene; and when a man can go into convention against a Eugene man, especially as good a man as Attorney A. E. Wheeler, and get the nomination it speaks loudly for the successful candidate. The republicans of this vicinity did not advocate Mr. Knox with the view that he would be partial to this section, but on the ground that he is an honest, conservative and conscientious man, who has cultivated in private life rigid principles of economy, which will not be laid aside should he be elected county judge. He will treat every section of Lane county alike, and that is what is needed. With Mr. Knox of South Lane as judge, Mr. Taylor of West Lane, and Mr. Edwards, the holdover, representing the central and eastern part of the county, the people of Lane will receive fair and impartial administration. In the matter of representatives Mr. Hemenway if elected will work for the interests of Lane county, and this fact was generally recognized by the delegates in the convention. He was placed by the side of Attorney L. T. Harris, a man above reproach and undoubtedly one of the most popular men in the county, as a running mate, and the vote he polled was beyond the most sanguine expectations of his supporters, demonstrating his strength in the convention from every section of the county. Mr. McQueen has the honor to succeed himself as representative and this of itself, say nothing of his irreproachable character, and sound republican principles, is a guarantee of his popularity throughout the county. Robert Hawley the nominee for sheriff, is a man of the people, a successful farmer, and a man who will always be found at his post of duty. In the matter of treasurer, so far as the honesty and integrity of the men who were before the convention there could be no choice. Mr. L. Gilstrap, the successful one, is a thorough accountant, an old soldier, and withal a cripple. He is fitted for the place, and should he be elected will make a competent officer. R. D. Burton needs no mention as to business qualifications for assessor. The office demands a thoroughly competent man, and Mr. Burton is peculiarly adapted to the position. In fact the whole ticket from top to bottom is one of the best placed before the people in years, and the best of it is harmony is plainly marked in the ranks.

General Otis has been relieved of command in the Philippines at his own request and will return home at once. General McArthur will succeed him as military governor.

While Bryan is headed for the White House overland, Dewey trying to reach it by water, they will find McKinley already there when the rush subsides.

The March number of Oregon Native Sons is at hand. It contains as usual many interesting articles from the pen of able writers, and is a valuable publication.

E. U. Lee succeeded himself in the nomination for county clerk in the republican county convention of Lane last Wednesday, a week. Mr. Lee's nomination means a reelection to that office, without regard to politics. He is a competent officer, thoroughly honest and a man above reproach in every way. The northern portion of the county can congratulate itself upon having so strong a man as Mr. Lee.

Hon. Harrison R. Kincaid, has made quite a jump-down, from secretary of state to the nomination for county judge on the "citizens ticket." As a rule when a man gets to going down he just keeps on and the chances are in this case, that the Honorable Harrison K. will not even stop at county judge. W. W. Withers was nominated on the citizens ticket for re-election to the office of sheriff, Amis and his class notwithstanding. Mr. Withers is the only available man in the "citizens" party who has a ghost of a show to be elected. Should he be elected Lane county will again have a democratic sheriff, and the populist brothers, who were admonished by Chairman Wilkins to "forget that they were populists," will have to hold the sack another two years, while the 'Guard rakes in the sheriff's patronage. However there is a chance, and a pretty good one, that they, the populists will be relieved from this embarrassment. Bob Hawley of Creswell, the republican nominee for sheriff, goes into the field with the solid support of the republican party of Lane county, and he is a man of splendid qualities and will likely preside over the destinies of the sheriff's office after next June.

The congressional convention for this district held at McMinnville on the 10th inst. was the most harmonious. There were five candidates, Tongue, Gatch, Brownell, Hewitt and Carter. While each candidate had some following, the convention was Tongue's from the moment of permanent organization. The best of feeling prevailed and while there were those who would have preferred a different result, they submitted to the inevitable in a true republican spirit, and today the 1st district stands solid for Thos. H. Tongue. The choice is a good one and the people will never regret his nomination and election.
