## VOTERS ATTENTION.

The attention of every voter of Lane county is called to the fact that it is now time to stop thinking about registering, and go and do it. The 15th of May is only a month off. After that time, if you have not complied with the law, you will have to content yourself with staying at home and letting other people do the voting. There is nothing unjust about the law, in fact it is calculated to do and will do good in the matter of purifying the ballot, especially so far as it relates to the cities. If you are conscientious in your political belief do not let the opportunity to register slip. Remember it will be too late after May 15.

Attorney Geo. M. Brown, of Douglas county, was re-nominated at the republican state convention for prosecuting attorney. Mr. Brown is the biggest little lawyer on earth and he has made a record for himself and his party while serving the state as prosecuting attorney second to none on the Pacific coast. He is one of the most thorough criminal lawyers known to the Northwest, and his reputation is such that when a "crook" gets behind the bars and is told that he will have to go through Brown's sweat box, he holds up his hands in horror and straightway pleads guilty.
