MINING NOTES.

E. S. Adams of the Golden Eagle Mining Co., has made a splendid strike on the company's property on Elephant Mountain.

John Wegers and W. H. White who have been located on Champion trail the last year, and who have been doing some prospect work on Adams Mountain, have been rewarded by the discovery of a four foot vein of free milling ore which is highly spoken of.

Chas. Gettys, of the Sweepstake group, Bohemia, has been prospecting in the district for the past month, and reports having struck a fine thing on the north of Elephant Mountain.

Work is continuing in a satisfactory manner on Sweepstake owned by Brund, Knowles and Gettys, Bohemia district. The boys are now drifting on the ledge, and are highly pleased with the prospects.

FROM SPOKESMAN REVIEW.

Several large nuggets have been found on the Mary Ann placers in Chesaw camp, Wash.

A stir is reported on West Fisher creek, 30 miles from Libby, Mont., where \$60 ore is reported in an old claim.

The pay roll of Rosland camp runs over \$100,000 per month. Of this amount the British Columbia corporation pays nearly three-fourths.

In the Muldoon group, near Belcher camp, 12 miles east of Republic, a strike in copper is reported, made in a 240-foot tunnel. Superintendent Edinams says there is a three-foot ledge which will average \$35. The formation is of limestone between granite and slate.

A strike is reported on a claim, between Delta and Carbon Center, Idaho. The claim is owned by John Dowd and J. J. Purcell, and lies in a direct continuation of the Amazon-Manhattan group. The ore is high grade milling, and was found near the surface. No assays have been made.

EUGENE REGISTER.

Expansion is a fact in Blue River. From Gold Hill, the nucleus of the district, it has expanded for many miles in nearly every direction. The latest discovery is across and several miles to the south of the McKenzie river. Parties making the discovery recently crossed the McKenzie near Gate Creek and followed the divide of a mountain range for 12 or 15 miles in an easterly direction, until about south of Blue River, where they have located some dozen claims. Another party headed by Max Plumb started for this new Eldorado from Sparks' hotel yesterday. It is quite likely that within a few years a chain of mines will be in operation along the mineral belt which undoubtedly extends from Blue River clear to Bohemia including the Fall Creek country where locations are now being made. Blue River and Bohemia may yet unite in forming one of the greatest mining districts on the Pacific coast.
