His life from boyhood was devoted to the accumulation of wealth, and money was his God. However, he has bequeathed to the world one lesson of material worth. He was born on a farm of poor parentage, and started out into the world without a dollar. A steady, cool and determined calculator, he turned every penny to good account and at his death—an old man—he left a fortune estimated anywhere from \$12,000,000 to \$40,000,000. His life proves that a boy can start poor in life and accumulate wealth, notwithstanding the cries of agitators to the contrary. But after all, whether a fortune is bundled together in this short span of life, either honestly or dishonestly, of what avail? C. P. Huntington, the great railroad king, the gigantic monarch of political influence; the man who possessed more wealth than he could count in a natural life time, could not, at his taking off, take one paltry cent piece with him. The journey yet to travel must be taken alone and unattended, and not even a pair of carpet slippers shall protect the bleeding feet treading the path eternal.

The Democratic press is very quick to report the falling off of a few disgruntled republicans whose plum has not been dropped into sugar, and who now trail after Bryan; but this same democratic press fails to say anything about the thousands of democrats and populists who, during the last three years have discerned that prosperity comes with republican administrations, and who today are advocating the re-election of McKinley on the grounds that during republican administrations they make a living and enough to keep the wolf of hunger from the door during the period when the people have fits and elect a democratic administration.

ABOUT THE MUSICK!

Great Development Work Under Contemplation--Big Tunnel.

J. W. Cook, who recently took charge of the Musick mine, pending a deal which has been under promotion by I. H. Bingham, the former superintendent and manager of the property, returned from Portland Thursday morning, and reports the affairs of the company in a most promising condition. Considerable delay has been occasioned owing to Mr. Bingham's inability to close up his deal with Eastern capitalists at as early a date as he had contemplated. However, the affairs of the company have been substantially adjusted through re-organization, which concedes to Mr. Bingham an extension of 30 days. In the event of failure of Mr. Bingham, the new company with Messrs. Cook, Jennings, Goodsell, Jones, and Bingham as principle stockholders, in connection with Eastern parties will take active control and immediately start development work on a large scale. The development work contemplated will be the largest yet planned for the district. A tunnel will be driven from the west, or Glenwood side of Bohemia Mountain, which will run at a far greater depth than the present work and at a length of some 2000 feet. This work will be of great benefit to the camp in general, determining at once the magnitude of the base conditions of the district. Manager Cook left for the mines Friday morning to look after the affairs of the company.
