

WEATHER CROP BUREAU.

The summary for the weather and crops throughout the state reads as follows:

The forepart of the week was warm and dry, while the closing days were cool and showery.

Taken as a whole, the days have been cooler than usual, owing to an excessive amount of cloudiness, while the nights have averaged above the normal.

The rains have been of great benefit to pastures and grass, and while delaying threshing and hop picking to a slight extent, it is not thought that any particular damage has resulted.

Hop picking was actively pushed during the fore part of the week and is now nearly completed in all but a few of the larger yards.

Prune drying continues. The recent rains have caused some of the Italian prunes to crack, and unless warm, sunny weather prevails soon considerable damage will result.

The harvesting of small grain is practically finished, except in portions of Eastern Oregon, where a few fields are yet to be cut.

A good crop of corn is being cut and shocked.

Potato digging is progressing; the crop, as a rule, is fair.

Work has commenced on summer fallow, but more rain is needed for fall plowing.

Grapes are ripening rapidly, the warm weather during the fore part of the week being very favorable for maturing this crop.

Apples continue promising.

GAME LAWS OF 1900.

For the benefit of those who have a desire know, the following from the game laws of Oregon are printed:

- LAWFUL TO KILL. Deer—July 15 to Nov. 1. Cannot be hunted for market or with dogs. Ducks—Sept. 1 to March 15. Must not be hunted at night. Grouse, Pheasant, Mongolian Pheasant, Quail or Partridge—Oct. 1 to Dec. 1. Snipe—Sept. 1 to Feb. 1. Silver Grey Squirrel—Oct. 1 to Jan. 1. Trout—April 1 to Nov. 1. Hook and line only. Must not be sold. Elk—Protected until Dec., 1910. Beaver—Protected until Feb. 25, 1915. Song birds protected at all times.
