

**FRANCE AND KRUGER.**

The remarkable ovation tendered to Paul Kruger by the French people upon his arrival at Marseilles will gladden the old Boer's heart at a time when it will be most appreciated. The mere fact that the people of France are characteristically impulsive, or that Kruger is being censured by other nations for having, as alleged, deserted his countrymen when his sympathy and encouragement were most needed, is no reason why praise should be withheld from the hospital, warm-hearted Frenchmen for their generous welcome.

When Marchand returned from Africa some years ago he came as the idol of his countrymen, notwithstanding the fact that through his miserable mismanagement of a dispute with the English, his nation had been humiliated before the world and a valuable concession added to British prestige. The average world power is not so generous. They hold to strict account every officer and plenipotentiary who thus errs. In our own country, for instance, the impression gained a foothold two years ago that General Otis had not exercised the wisdom and foresight in the management of affairs in the Philippines that he should have, and the result was that when he returned home after much wearing, conscientious toil he was given the barest kind of welcome and a week after his arrival his name had passed into cheerless silence. Not so with the French people, however. They are quick to hate, but always as quick to forget and forgive.

Aside altogether from the mistaken deductions of the detractors of Paul Kruger, it cannot be denied that the stern old warrior stands before the world as a man of iron. His diplomacy may have been faulty, his zeal overdone, but who will say that when the time for action came—when the first gun was fired—that he did not face the issue with all the resoluteness and patriotism of the hero? He knew the strength of the enemy, possibly foresaw eventual defeat, but believing in the infinite mercy of God, and loving the priceless principle of liberty as few have loved it, he determined to fight to the death. The great tragedy that followed all the world knows, and although beaten and starving, with their homes lying in ashes and desolate in the extreme, the old warrior has gone forth still cherishing the hope that through some peculiar dispensation of Providence a friendly light may yet dispel the darkness. That is his mission to France. It will be his mission to this country and to other nations that he may visit.

Our commercial relations with England may prevent the government from taking the active part in extending a welcome to Kruger that the French government has taken, but it is safe to predict that the great heart of the masses and classes will go out in sympathy as warm as that demonstrated by the masses of France, among whom is a genuine admiration for the Boer and an equally genuine hatred for the British. Few nations, our own among the others, will be enabled to do officially as France has done.

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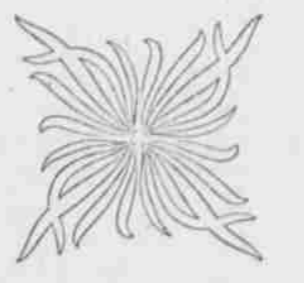
