### THE SAME PARK.

C. H. Park, who has a bond on the Golden Wedge, reports since his return from the property at Galice, that in tunnelling in on the property about 100 feet, they have discovered a fine ledge of very rich rock, that measures between wall's 5 1/2 feet. He brought some of the rock in; the gold is very perceptible through most of the rock. He has not had it assayed, but thinks it will easily go from \$200 to \$400 to the ton. Mr. Park is pleased but not elated. He now desires to know how far the ledge extends, and to find this out is running other tunnels.—Oregon Mining Journal.

The above is Mr. Park all over. Last year he visited Bohemia, and upon his first visit went into ecstasies over the Vesuvius property and thereupon bonded the same for \$35,000. He also bonded the Stock, Harlow & Brush property for \$30,000. Mr. Park then betook himself to England to arrange his financial affairs with the view of "turning old Vesuvius upside down," as he wrote back. Finally he came back and dabbled a little more with development work. But for some reason or other his enthusiasm began to simmer and then cooled, and after awhile became chilled to the core. Mr. Park then wanted an extension of time. The owners of the property refused and he let go, and it is said that since then he has said some very bitter things against Bohemia. However, the development of both the Vesuvius and Stocks, Harlow & Brush property this year has branded Mr. Park a poor guesser else a man whose opinion and good intentions are questionable. The Vesuvius has proved itself to be better than ever before, while the Stock & Harlow property is said to be the richest thing in Oregon with nearly \$1,000,000 in sight, although this fact may not "please" nor "elate" Mr. Park.

Considerable complaint is heard here and elsewhere regarding the various kinds of punishment used in the schools. It is said that a teacher of a certain country school not far from here, recently whipped a child until large welts were made upon the person of the child, also bruises of undeniable severity, which were noticeable several days after inflicting the punishment. It is said that one of the teachers in the Cottage Grove school is inclined to be very severe in dealing out punishment. On one occasion it is said a little boy was slapped because he did not have his mathematics, and that he screamed with pain from the effects of the blow. No one will deny a school teacher the right to punish pupils, but punishment should fit the misdemeanor, and at no time, nor under any circumstances should a teacher bruise or beat a child. A teacher is never excusable for slapping or striking a child with the fist or open hand, and can be dealt with much severity for the practice. A whip is an essential thing in school and few parents object to the use of it, but they are justified in criticizing a teacher who punishes with club, open hand or clenched fist.

And now the legislature is to be asked to again amend the state game and fish law. It has long been known that it was out of balance somewhere and needed fixing, and many attempts have been made to fix it, but very little progress has thus far been made in the right direction. Now if they will cut out about half of the enactments already enacted along this line and put a little common sense into the other half they will get the proposition started off right.

The senatorial question is now attracting considerable attention among those who have a weakness for politics, and no end of speculation is abroad in the land as to who will be the victorious candidate. McBride, our present senator is of course expecting renomination. Corbett is looking upon the big red plume with wishful eyes; Congressman Herman it is said would not blush, turn crimson and dodge if the office should be thrown at him, while 'tis whispered that ex-Senator Mitchell, may possibly loom up as a dark horse on the senatorial track. Every man of course has his friends and his enemies, but take it all in all the people of the state can congratulate themselves upon the fact that none of the above mentioned men are very slow when it comes to politics, and every one of them would no doubt make the state a good worker.
