It is said there are a few members of the Oregon legislature this session who have not aspired to the United States senatorship—which is considered a very fine joke in those days.

As a general thing the people of this place think it a little slow just now, but when traveling men and visitors tell us that it is the liveliest town in the valley, one cannot help but pity some of the others.

The city authorities of San Francisco have just passed an ordinance, setting forth that the street car companies shall carry school children for half fare. It will be many a dollar saved to the parents of that city.

It seems that Linn county got in on the ground floor and bit off a chunk of Lane county to the chagrin of some Lane county citizens. It was generally thought that our delegation would find a way to avoid giving up acreage.

The average Oregonian is heard to "kick" at the past two weeks of pleasant weather. To him the prevalent frosty days and nights are conducive to a general epidemic of lagrippe, and nearly every family has had its invalid. It has been observed by the medical fraternity that such weather is always productive of much sickness and farther that when the good old Webfoot rains come following such a spell the general health of the community shows a marked improvement within 48 hours.

Representative Story believes that the time has arrived for the state to extend recognition and patronage to the mining industry and has introduced a bill for the establishment of a Bureau of Mines and the appointment of a Commissioner of Mines. The Commissioner of Mines is to be appointed by the governor, and is to receive \$3000 a year salary. The bill carries an appropriation of \$6000 for the salary of the Commissioner of Mines for the ensuing two years, and \$9000 for the establishment of the Bureau of Mines.

Within the last twelve months two miners in Bohemia have met with fearful accidents owing to cave-ins while under ground. Miners like every other class of workmen become careless of their personal safety as they grow old at their work. The accident of last week should be a lesson to every man who works underground. No one can be too careful. A little extra work spent in timbering and making things safe will in the end pay, by doing away with the possibility of having to do over again the work already accomplished, say nothing of the safety of life and limb.

Mrs. Nation may be sincere in her work, but such methods of reform will not reform. You cannot enforce temperance nor legislate successfully in its favor. Get to the bottom of the evil. Educate the people that the business of selling intoxicants is wrong. Don't try to keep a man out of the saloon by fine or abuse, because you can't do it, and in the attempt Mrs. Nation and her following weaken their own cause. Because you do not approve of certain occupations which the law grants permission to exist, does not justify you in destroying the property of the one engaging in such occupation.

A WISE JUDGE.

Judge Dixon who passed sentence upon McAlister, Death and Campbell, the murderers of Jennie Bosschietter at Patterson, N. J., is deserving of the title of "Most Wise Judge," and should have the commendation of the people. Various petitions were presented to him urging clemency in sentencing, likewise eloquent appeals from able attorneys. He withstood them all, and sentenced the men in accordance with the verdict found. When arraigned before him for sentence, Judge Dixon expressed himself in the following words: "You stand convicted of murder in the second degree. Had you been found guilty of murder in the first degree punishment would have been death, but the leniency of the jury in the exercise of its lawful authority saved you from the gallows. We must administer laws as they are. It is true these sentences will destroy your lives, obliterating every prospect of an honorable existence among the people. The court cannot make any distinction, but must sentence you for this crime. I trust the fearful consequences of this crime will help young men and young women of this community and point out to them that they cannot hope to secure happiness outside of virtue and honor. The sentence of the court is that each of you be imprisoned in the state prison at hard labor for a term of thirty years."
