

PRESIDENTIAL TRAIN.

The president's special train will pass through Cottage Grove on May 23, about 5 p. m. The train will be preceded 15 minutes by a pilot engine to which there will be attached one or two cars. All trains must be out of way of the special, and freight trains will be practically abandoned on that day. All passenger trains will be in the clear 45 minutes before the arrival of the pilot train. All switches will be spiked ahead and engines will be in readiness at all terminals. W. S. Conser the veteran conductor will have charge of the president's train from Ashland to Portland. Conductor Conser is the oldest conductor in the service of the S. P. Co., having been in their employ 29 years.

FELL FROM TRAIN.

The body of Richard Rhodes was found Saturday in the Newaukum river near Chehalis, Wash. Young Rhodes in company with his older brother was beating their way on a passenger train when the accident occurred. They both fell asleep and the older brother on awaking missed his companion and alighted at the next stop and instituted search for him, but was unable to find him until Saturday when his remains were found in the river. It is supposed that he fell from the train as it was crossing the bridge which spans the river. Rhodes was 29 years of age and was well known here, having resided about two years in this city and Saginaw. He was formerly from Drain.

COUNCIL MEETING.

An Interesting Sermon—Report of Water Committee—The Bicycle Question.

Monday evening council met in regular session. Mayor Veatch in the chair.

After passing upon the usual number of bills the following business was transacted.

The special committee on securing an additional supply of water, reported that the only available water supply in their judgment was that of LaFayette Veatch Creek. The nearest point from the city limits from which water could be taken was approximately estimated at 12,000 feet, and that it would require 8000 feet of four inch pipe to bring it to the western limits of the city.

Ordinance No. 48—Empowering the mayor and recorder to enter into contract with W. H. Abrams & Co., for the furnishing of 5 32 candle power and 2 16 candle power electric lights at \$10 per month; passed.

Ordinance No. 50—Fixing salary of city marshal at \$40 per month and 10 per cent of all money collected for water rent, with bonds at \$500; fixing salary of city recorder as clerk of the common council, \$100 per annum with bonds at \$1000; passed.

Ordinance No. 51—Regulating the business of dealers in second hand goods, requiring them to keep a record of all goods bought and sold, and prescribing a penalty for violation thereof; passed.

City recorder was instructed to compare an ordinance prohibiting the riding of bicycles on any of the walks of Cottage Grove. The hour of ringing the curfew was changed to 9 o'clock from May 1 to Oct. 1. The mayor was instructed to call a public meeting with a view of determining the water question and he accordingly set next Friday evening, May 10.

The water committee was then instructed to call for bids for the city plumbing for the ensuing year. The recorder was instructed to warn the Southern Pacific Company to remove all barbed wire fence along their right of way within the city limits. Adjourned to meet Saturday night, May 11.

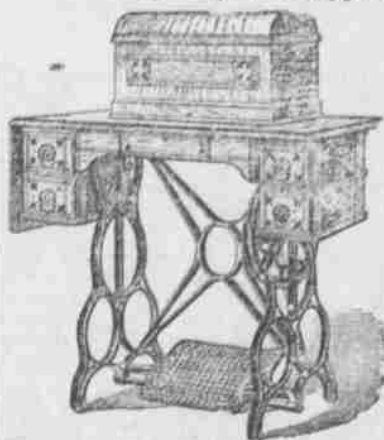
