WORK OF ROCK CRUSHER NO. 2.

An employe who has been with the county rock crusher operating in this part of the county this summer sends the Eugene Guard an account of its operations, from which we take the following:

This crusher with M. C. Goodenow of Eugene in charge, commenced operations at Divide on May 4. At that point 1 1/2 miles of road about eight feet in width was covered with the crushed rock for a depth of 10 to 12 inches. That road extends from the Frank M. Veatch place, about four miles south of Cottage Grove, south to the farm of E. F. Smith at Divide. The crusher was then moved to the Cochran farm about one mile north of Cottage Grove. At this place the road north of the Coast Fork has been placed in a similar condition as the one at Divide, from the city limits to a point just below the county bridge across the Coast Fork, a distance of one and a half miles. This road heretofore during the rainy season has been almost impassible but now it will be equal to the best roads in the county.

At present the crusher is grinding out rock for a small piece of road in Cottage Grove. During the latter part of the week it will be removed to Saginaw where there is about three-quarters of a mile of road to be treated with crushed rock. From that place it will be removed to Walker's Station, where there is two week's work awaiting the plant, and from that place it will be removed to Goshen where the season's work will be finished. From there the plant will be taken to the farm of County Commissioner H. D. Edwards where it will be housed for the winter. Mr. Goodenow expects to finish the season's work about November 1st.

When the commissioners' court placed Mr. Goodenow in charge of this crusher they certainly selected the right man for the position. While everything is bought that is needed for the operation of the plant, the utmost economy is observed in all departments of the work. So close attention has he paid to every detail since he has been placed in charge of the plant that there has not been a single accident worthy of mention.

There are about 13 men employed with this crusher and the cost to the county is about \$25 per day. While this may seem extravagant to some, yet the road treated by crushed rock is in perfect condition and on the whole this is the most economic way of building permanent roads.

The rock is taken from the quarries and broken up by men employed for the purpose and hauled to the crusher with two wagons.
