

LONG'S TRACT SOLD.

The fine tract of land on the east boundary of Cottage Grove has this week changed hands. This property has been owned by George Long and contains sixty acres. The purchase price paid was \$15,000 and the new owners are I. H. Bingham and J. C. Long. It is understood that George Long will shortly move his flouring mill to a site on the Columbia river in the neighborhood of Bridal Veil or Latourelle. The new purchasers will now proceed to plot about twenty-five acres along the county road and the S. P. railroad line opposite the depot and will offer the sub-division for sale in the near future. George W. Lloyd has been engaged to make the survey and plat the ground and will begin work next week. It is expected that in about ten days lots will be ready for sale.

THE CRIPPLE CREEK GROUP.

Gilbertson, who superintends the work on the Oregon-Colorado and Wall street claims, owns the other half of the Cripple Creek Group. This property is destined in the future to become a great mine.

IN THE FIELD.

A Full and Efficient Crew and Fast Work Being Done.

The Start Made at the S. P. Depot and Runs North and East through the Perkins Property.

On Sunday last the remainder of the surveying outfit arrived for work on the Cottage Grove and Bohemia railroad. Everything being in readiness the entire party took the field on Monday morning. They are all practical men and as each knew his business and station there was not even a hitch and everything went with a whirl and a vim. The weather was and is delightful and could not have been more auspicious for the inauguration of this enterprise. The entire outfit is camped on the east end of town in five large tents, which can and will be moved further out as the work requires.

Monday and Tuesday the preliminary lines were run beyond the Currin bridge, some seven miles out, and the remainder of the week is being consumed in perfecting these lines into a permanent survey. The work is being done in a most thorough manner and draughts are being made of every cut, fill, curve, culvert, tressel and bridge that will be required along the route, to the end that when the surveyors have completed their work all will be in readiness for the graders, bridge builders and track layers.

It is thought and expected that the completed survey will not have been accomplished before the early part of January. The force of men now in the field numbers fifteen, but when the belts of heavy timber are reached, through which the road will have to pass, an increase in the force will be found necessary and will be made.

P. J. Jennings and Chief Surveyor Wood on Tuesday went over the proposed route up the Mosby creek to note if a feasible outlet could be had to swing back again on Row river. It was found that there was no serious obstacles to be encountered in that direction. Superintendent Behne, J. W. Cook and Professor Kimball went into Bohemia on Wednesday to inspect the terminal grounds and conditions of that end of the route.

The advent of the surveyors and their vigorous work has set many tongues wagging and the air is rife with speculation. The simon pure mossback is completely frustrated and stoically refuses to believe his own vision. With him the wish is father to the thought that there be no improvement and he goes about with the stereotyped utterance on his lips that the road will never be built. His desire is doomed to disappointment, for the road will be built, equipped and run, and if the doubter lives another year he may ride over the route into the richest mineral zone this world has ever known.

TRYING NEW WATER SUPPLY.

On Tuesday afternoon Rescue Company No. 1 of the fire department brought out its apparatus and hose and tested the new supply of water from the Gowdyville reservoir. The fire ladders strung out two lines of new hose, coupled them onto the new hydrant at the intersection of Wall and River streets, turned the flood gate and in a jiffy two streams of water from the new reservoir were being thrown through the air a distance of from 80 to 100 feet with volume and pressure sufficient to control any ordinary fire that may occur. Everything being new there was quite a little delay in handling the tools, and it would not be a bad idea if the members of Rescue Hose would have a number of drills so as to get everything in smooth working order.
