FARM POULTRY

"Why is poultry valuable to the farmer?" is answered by Prof. Gilbert of Ontario, Oregon.

1. Because he ought, by their means, to convert a great deal of the waste of his farm into money in the shape of eggs and chickens for the market.

2. Because with intelligent management, they ought to be all year producers, with the exception of perhaps two months during the moulting season.

3. Because poultry will yield him a quicker return for the capital invested than any other department of agriculture.

4. Because the manure from the poultry house will make a valuable compost for use in either vegetable garden or orchard. The birds themselves, if allowed to run in plum or apple orchard, will destroy all injurious insect life.

5. Because, while cereals and fruit can only be grown in certain sections, poultry can be raised for table use or layers of eggs in all parts of the country.

6. Because poultry raising is an employment in which the farmer's wife and daughters can engage and leave him free to attend to other departments.

7. Because it will bring him the best results in the shape of new laid eggs during the winter season when the farmer has most time on his hands.

8. Because to start poultry raising on the farm, requires little or no capital. By good management, poultry can be made, with little cost, a valuable adjunct on the farm.—Gem State Rural.
