F. Morphy, the railroad pole's representative, stated the aims and objects of the railroad promoters and gave assurance of their ability to build the road.

Had that the company asked for financial help that on the completion of the survey, which when he finished, the company is prepared to begin building the road provided the right of way was secured to them across the deep land for the first twenty miles that his information from them was to the effect that by the time the survey was completed the right to enter the Cascade reservation should be granted.

That company asked for no deed right or was until the road was closed and actual operation had been further willing to submit to a time limit when the railroad would be an actual fact, and what was asked was the hearty cooperation of the citizens of Cottage Grove and the property owners of the Row river, Monday, Tuesday and Sharp's creeks.
