The open air treatment for persons in early stages of consumption is shown to have been efficacious to the extent of about 67 per cent of the cases which were treated during the past year at the Massachusetts State Sanitarium at Rutherford, according to the annual report made public recently. There was but one death during the year, and the percentage of cures or of marked improvement was considerably higher than for two years past.

THAT RIGHT OF WAY.

W. F. Morphy, representing the Cottage Grove and Bohemia Railroad Company, expects to leave for the East at the close of this week. He goes to make final report to his company, and this report will determine whether Cottage Grove will be the starting point of the road or not.

Mr. Morphy is a thorough gentleman, and has made many substantial friends here by his fair and courteous manner toward those with whom he has come in contact in matters pertaining to the right of way. He has asked nothing for his company except that which is just and right in the minds of people who have taken time to study into the merits of the proposition from a fair and impartial point of view.

It is not because those who have declined to act do not wish to see the mining district, Cottage Grove and the intermediate section of country enriched by the expenditure of \$500,000 in a railroad enterprise but because they cannot conclude on a reasonable price for damages for right of way through their property; and because they do not fully understand and have not carefully weighed the great benefit the road will be in the matter of increasing the value of the property of this section of Lane county.

Now, gentlemen, the time is at hand when we should look each other in the face and become serious in this matter, for much depends upon the impression Mr. Morphy carries away with him. He has shown no disposition to want the earth, but he has frankly confessed that his company does want the right of way. Now, if we do not desire a hitch and an unnecessary delay in the building of the road, we should show our willingness to comply, and "come to the center" at once. Delays are dangerous. By all means, let us take the hint and send Mr. Morphy on his home trip prepared to tell his people that the entire right of way has been pledged.

This will give Mr. Morphy and his company something to base their immediate future operations upon. The company can then get their construction outfits in readiness to begin operations at the earliest break in winter. Gentlemen, let us look well to this matter and stand by for the good of all concerned. Saginaw is not very far off, you know; but far enough to materially damage the business enterprises of Cottage Grove.
