FOURTEEN ELEMENTS OF LOVE.

One of the most instructive and startling applications of the theory of evolution is made by Henry T. Fink in his book "Primitive Love and Love Stories," who traces the development of love from the brutal and promiscuous taste of the savage to the refined and pure love of the highest Christian civilization.

Fink makes a distinction between conjugal affection and romantic love. The first, he says, antedated the second because in very early times there were noble examples of the devotion of a wife and husband for each other, while in those times there were no opportunities for courtship and, therefore, that pure, romantic pre-matrimonial love which is known to the moderns could not have existed. The author anatomizes romantic love and finds that it is made of fourteen ingredients, individual preference, monopolism, coyness, jealousy, mixed moods of hope and despair, hyperbole, adoration, purity, pride, admiration of personal beauty, gallantry, self-sacrifice, sympathy and affection. He divides these elements into two groups of seven: the egoistic and the altruistic, and scouts the prevailing notion that love is a species of double selfishness. The altruistic and supersensual elements, he says, are the more essential characteristics of romantic love.

With truly scientific thoroughness, Fink traces each of these fourteen elements through all ages and in many nations, and shows that each is a product of evolution; that individual preference does not exist among very many tribes in which the husband buys his bride from her father for so many cows and would not pay more than market price; that monopolism was preceded by polygamy and polyandry; that jealousy is unknown in many lands and, particularly, was unknown formerly in the Hawaiian Islands; that coyness is a modern product, unknown to ancient literature, and that in some tribes the women propose; and that each of the other ingredients is an artificial phenomenon attending the evolution of the idea of romantic love.

Fink's answer to the question, "What is romantic love?" takes up 235 closely printed pages, and even those pages are only a preliminary sketch, which is enlarged and completed in the succeeding 538 pages. He confesses that he has not been able to condense the essential traits of romantic love into one brief definition. The Century Dictionary's definition is: "Intimate personal affection between individuals of opposite sex capable of intermarriage; the emotional incentive to and normal basis of conjugal union." Fink, who declares that he has been in love four times, criticises this definition as being correct enough so far as it goes, "but how little it tells of the nature of love!" He submits this approximate definition:

"Love is an intense longing for the reciprocal affection and jealously exclusive possession of a particular individual of the opposite sex; a chaste, proud, ecstatic adoration of one who appears a paragon of personal beauty and otherwise immeasurably superior to all other persons; an emotional state constantly hovering between doubt and hope, aggravated in the female heart by the fear of revealing her feelings too soon; a self-forgetful impulse to share the tastes and feelings of the beloved, and to go so far in affectionate and gallant devotion as to eagerly sacrifice, for the other's good, all comfort and life itself if necessary."

It might be an interesting amusement for lovers to analyze their emotions and detect, if they can, each of Fink's fourteen ingredients. Mr. Fink wrote his book in all seriousness, filled it with curious historical and anthropological information, but did not attribute a sense of humor to the perfect-lover—an unfortunate omission.

Notice to Tax Payers.

NEW TAX LAW.

At the last session of the legislature a new law was passed in regard to the collection of taxes, which law took effect on December 1st, 1901, and in substance is as follows:

1. If you pay your taxes on or before March 15th you will be allowed a rebate of three per cent.
2. If you pay your taxes between March 15th and up to and including the first Monday in April, there will not be any rebate and neither will there be any penalty or interest added.
3. If your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday in April, they will become delinquent, when there will be added a penalty of 10 per cent, and the tax will also draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum in addition to the penalty.
4. If you pay one-half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April, then the remaining half may run up to and including the first Monday in October following; but if the last half of tax due is not paid by the first Monday of October, it becomes delinquent, and there will be added to such balance, a penalty of 10 per cent, and in addition, such balance will bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum from the first Monday in April until paid.
5. On all personal property taxes if one-half is not paid on or before the first Monday in April, the law compels the sheriff to levy upon and collect the same after May 1st, hence to prevent a levy upon personal property after May 1st it will be necessary for one-half to be paid as above stated.
6. The law compels the sheriff to sell all lands on which taxes have not been paid, and that such sales shall not be held later than March 1st of the year succeeding the year in which the tax levy is made.
7. The property will be sold to the person bidding the lowest rate of interest, and certificates will be issued therefor, and deeds given to such property sold, unless redeemed within three years from the date of such sales.

The 1901 assessment rolls will be received at the sheriff's office March 1st, 1902. Any written enquiries regarding 1901 taxes received prior to that date will be filed and promptly attended to as soon as the books are open for payments. In making enquiries as to amount of taxes, if possible, give to whom the property is assessed and a description of the same.
