

SMALLPOX.—

The three McAdams brothers, employed at the tie plant at Latham came down with the smallpox last Sunday. Last Tuesday night Superintendent Kohler of the S. P. arrived in special car and made inquiries into the situation and ascertained the needs of the sick; and Thursday trained nurses and such conveniences as were needed arrived from Portland. The attending physician says that while the cases are severe, there is no necessity for alarm, as every precaution was taken as soon as he was called. With the exception of three or four all the employees of the plant have been vaccinated, and the car in which the sick are confined has been removed to the extreme limit of the company's grounds and the others properly disinfected, and strict quarantine has been established.

SERIOUSLY ILL.—

A week ago last Tuesday J. W. Baker of this city was taken seriously ill at the family home with pneumonia in both lungs, accompanied with acute pleurisy of the left side and with it inflammation of the pericardium. His condition became alarming almost from the start, and Friday and Saturday his case was extremely critical. Sunday morning Dr. Gallrath, superintendent of the state insane asylum was called in consultation. However Sunday Mr. Baker showed signs of improvement which continued steadily, and at the present time, while his case is still considered extremely critical, he is in fair way to immediate recovery.

REVIVAL CLOSED —

The revival meeting at the M. E. church in this city closed with Sunday evening's services. Some ninety-seven were received into the church besides a number going to other denominations. Naturally the church is highly pleased with the result of the protracted service and feels that much good will be the result. In this the church certainly has the sentiment of all law-abiding citizens, and none will deny the need of reform in this community. Evangelist Marshel went to Roseburg from here where he opened a series of meetings Monday evening.

INHUMAN.—

It has been reported that three horses were left tied in the city limits of Cottage Grove from 8 o'clock last Saturday morning until 8 o'clock Sunday morning, without the least care or attention, so far as anyone knows. They were not only without food but were tied where they were obliged to stand in mud almost knee deep. It is about time a humane society was organized here and the perpetrators of such cruel and inhuman treatment be made to pay a good round fine for such depravity.
