FAVORS GOOD ROADS.

The following is from the pen of a correspondent to the Roseburg Review, and is of interest to those who see the necessity of having good roads in Oregon:

"It seems to me that if ever the county court of Douglas county performed a meritorious act it was when it levied a 3-mill tax. The only fault to be found with that tax is because it is only about one-third what it ought to be. A 10-mill levy for road purposes would not have been too high considering the disgraceful condition of our roads. I have been paying road taxes in other states, and in no other state or county have the taxes for road purposes been so ridiculously low as in Douglas county; and everybody will admit that no where else is the necessity of a reasonable road tax as apparent as in western Oregon. And especially that piece of road that abominable hill east of town. Why it's an outrage to common people to pass over such a canal of mire called roads. A county court, or council, or a people that tortures dumb animals by compelling them to draw loads over such roads certainly ought to be prosecuted for cruelty to animals.

But some whine something about high taxes and economy. I say d—n economy, where in order to economize we have to wallow through the mire up to our knees in going to town and besides, don't the politicians in power, from the highest to the lowest, tell us that we are enjoying an era of unparalleled prosperity? Certainly, if that's the case, we ought to be able to stand a three-mill, or four-mill, or even ten-mill tax for the purpose of making good roads.

Two years ago, while living in Eden bower, about a mile from the county road, five of us neighbors were confronted by the same question as that which confronts the people of Douglas county today. Our private lane was almost impassable. Something had to be done in order to enable us to get to the county road. Well, we met, consulted, and levied a voluntary tax—not of three mills or five mills or ten mill, but of 20 mills—just double our regular tax—and built a piece of road that the whole neighborhood is proud of today, the best piece of road in or around Roseburg, and it didn't "break" any of us either, but was the best investment we ever made. Now if a 20-mill extra tax did not bankrupt us five neighbors, why should not the people of the whole county be able and willing to pay a three, five or even ten-mill tax in order to make a start to get roads that are fit for civilized people to travel over?

If any body commences to whine about that 3-mill tax, or tries to make political capital out of it by crying economy—hit him with a brick and hit him hard. Yours for good roads though it takes the bottom dollar."

Notice to Tax Payers.

NEW TAX LAW.

At the last session of the legislature a new law was passed in regard to the collection of taxes, which law took effect on December 1st, 1901, and in substance is as follows:

- 1 If you pay your taxes on or before March 15th you will be allowed a rebate of three per cent.
- 2 If you pay your taxes between March 15th and up to and including the first Monday in April, there will not be any rebate and neither will there be any penalty or interest added.
- 3 If your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday of April, they will become delinquent, when there will be added a penalty of 10 per cent, and the tax will also draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum in addition to the penalty.
- 4 If you pay one-half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April, then the remaining half may run up to and including the first Monday in October following; but if the last half of tax due is not paid by the first Monday of October, it becomes delinquent, and there will be added to such balance, a penalty of 10 per cent, and in addition, such balance will bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum from the first Monday in April until paid.
- 5 On all personal property taxes if one-half is not paid on or before the first Monday in April, the law compels the sheriff to levy upon and collect the same after May 1st, hence to prevent a levy upon personal property after May 1st it will be necessary for one-half to be paid as above stated.
- 6 The law compels the sheriff to sell all lands on which taxes have not been paid, and that such sales shall not be held later than March 1st of the year succeeding the year in which the tax levy is made.
- 7 The property will be sold to the person bidding the lowest rate of interest, and certificates will be issued therefor, and deeds given to such property sold, unless redeemed within three years from the date of such sales.

The 1901 assessment rolls will be received at the sheriff's office March 1st, 1902. Any written enquiries regarding 1901 taxes received prior to that date will be filed and promptly attended to as soon as the books are open for payments. In making enquiries as to amount of taxes, if possible, give to whom the property is assessed and a description of the same.
