LANE TAXES.

Friday was the last day on which payment of taxes in full allowed the 3 per cent discount. Lane county collects \$173,000 each year and of that amount \$100,000 has been collected, of this amount \$60,000 was collected at Eugene and \$40,000 at Cottage Grove and Junction. All taxes become delinquent on April 1st. Of the \$173,000 taxes, the state is entitled to \$42,504.
