There is a rumor on the streets to the effect that Dr. Job, the nominee for mayor of Cottage Grove, at the coming election, will use his efforts to defeat the city in the street assessment case now pending. The rumor is evidently put in circulation by those who are opposed to Dr. Job, and is silly and inconsistent. Anyone who will give the matter a moment's attention will conclude that no matter what a mayor's inclinations might be on a subject of that kind, that he could exercise no influence whatever for or against, that would have any bearing on the case. The case is beyond the consideration and influence of the executive officers of the municipality. It is now in the hands of the court. The attorneys are the only ones who can order or have the case dismissed. The friends of Dr. Job need not worry. He will be found a sturdy worker, fair, upright and honorable in his dealings; and his past record is witness that under no consideration would he become a party to tricks and dishonorable methods for or against the city. He is an honest, painstaking, upright man, upon whom the burden and responsibility of municipal office has rested year in and year out, and that is the kind of a man that is needed to preside over a city government.

The Nugget has been asked to call attention to the conduct of certain parties who make it a habit to visit the depot at train time and cut up and act funny when the trains pull in. While in most part the actions are harmless and unthought of on the part of the participants, still it goes without saying that it places the town in a very bad light when viewed by the average passenger; and in some instances much rudeness has been resorted to, in yelling and guffing travelers. It is, at its best, ungentlemanly, and cannot help reflecting on the participants as well as the town, and we should all have more pride than to practice such things.

There is some strife between the east and west republican delegates to the County Convention. The fault is not altogether one-sided, but each delegation should make strenuous efforts to put up a solid front. In this way South Lane can do something of direct benefit to this section of the county. We will make a better appearance, will have more weight, and will feel better generally, if we can fall into harmonious line.

There is some talk among the delegates of West Cottage Grove to use their efforts in the matter of securing the nomination of a South Lane man for county commissioner. It has been a long time since this section of Lane county has been represented in the county court, and South Lane is certainly deserving of some consideration.

The mining, farming, timbering and stock raising industries are what make enterprising and thrifty towns. Watch Cottage Grove and vicinity and you will be convinced that this is the place where all of these named industries thrive.

Every man should have pride enough to keep his own back yard clean whether his neighbor does or not—this can be applied in various ways—but just now it is applicable to the back door yards of many of the residences of this city.

The city of Roseburg has, without doubt the dirtiest and muddiest streets of any city of its size on the Pacific coast. We hate to say it of any city, but we have to—we never could tell a lie—about such things.
