## Mines and Mining

Devoted to Bohemia Notes and Items of general interest to Mining Men.

Mining Manager Alfred Johnson and J. C. Johnson, vice president of the Le Roy company returned from Bohemia Friday after having spent 19 days at the company's mines. They report development work at the Le Roy mine progressing rapidly, the work for the past month has been concentrated on the No 3 drift on the Laura, mining claim. The tunnel at this place is now in over 100 feet, developing a large galena ore chute about 12 feet wide running the full length of the tunnel at the present time. It is the intention of the company to drive this tunnel with all possible speed a distance of about 1,000 feet thereby topping over on the main ore chutes at a depth of about 800 feet. Those who secure stock in the Le Roy Co. will be very fortunate indeed.

Superintendent Behne says: The two new ore chutes in the "Helena" still continue to improve in width and values. Every foot of development insuring large shipments of ore as soon as transportation can be secured; and as the railroad is now an undisputed fact Bohemia will prove to be one of the greatest camps on the Pacific coast. Great preparations are being made for the future development of the camp at the "Le Roy." The showing of ore is improving beyond all expectations, and helps to prove the permanency of the vast mineral resources of Bohemia.

John Russell, Supt. of the Hiawatha mining and milling company arrived in town from Bohemia Wednesday. Mr. Russell is down for the purpose of purchasing supplies and making arrangements for extensive operations on the company's property to commence about the first of May. This company is negotiating now for and intend placing a mill on the property as soon as the roads are in a condition to permit of transportation. Stock on this property is finding ready sale at 5 cents per share, and there is only a limited amount of stock remaining for sale at this price.

Judge Cochran, of Matipos, Cal. basing his opinion on that of the late Judge Sawyer, has held that the rights of property extend to the center of the earth, and that the ownership of properties was not confined to the surface. Hence no one can cut into another's property by digging or boring from underneath, although lying adjacent to it. In the same manner it is held that the miner is estopped by the lateral lines described by patent.

E. S. Lovelace, president of the Sunrise Mining Company, arrived this week and proceeded to the mines. The company intends to immediately commence extensive development on the May Homestead and Dakota, and are arranging to take in full supplies of mining tools and material, so that work will be progressing as soon as the weather permits.

### ALFALFA HAY FOR HORSES.

Opinions differ very much as to the value of alfalfa hay for horses. Some regard it as indispensable in feeding horses under their conditions: Others again speak strongly against it. It would be difficult to account for this conflict of opinion were it not for the fact that alfalfa when fed freely at the first to horses that are working hard, induces too lax a condition of the bowels. It also causes the animals to sweat unduly and in many instances to urinate too freely. But those who have had much experience in feeding it say that in three or four weeks these symptoms pass away and unless fed in excess the horses do well on it, better, all things considered, than on prairie hay. It is recommended to begin by feeding but a few pounds per day at first, and to gradually increase the quantity until 10 to 15 pounds a day are reached for an ordinary horse. More than the last named amount may be fed with a reduced amount of grain but when fed in any very large quantities, if laxness of the bowels are induced, the quantity ought to be reduced for a time. Alfalfa has the property of helping to keep horses in good condition. It also tends to give them a glossy coat. Horses have been fed on alfalfa for many years, getting at the same time a due allowance of grain, and the results have been most satisfactory. This splendid food is coming to be prized, as it ought to be. Where it will grow it ought certainly to be grown.—The Farmer.

Kaupisch just returned from that vicinity, after putting in five separators in the neighborhood of Halsey and three near Junction. The cans of cream are shipped to the Kaupisch creamery by rail.—Corvallis Times.

It is incumbent on Oregon farmers who raise potatoes to make every effort to keep up the quality of their product. While high prices may very probably lead to over-production this year there is a steadily growing demand for Oregon potatoes in California, Arizona and elsewhere which will be worth a great deal to the farmers of this state if the trade is held.—Ex.
