Some one is always sure to be disappointed at a county convention. In the case of the late Lane county republican convention, disappointment fell upon the heads of the east Cottage Grove precinct, with perhaps more weight than upon any other delegation there. It was the honest effort of the East delegation to place in nomination for representative Chas. H. Burkholder. Whether the work was good, bad, or indifferent, no one can say that Mr. Burkholder's supporters were not energetic and true to him. When the ax fell it cut as deep the feelings of his ardent admirers as it did Mr. Burkholder himself, perhaps more so. However, it is over, and a splendid ticket, from top to bottom, is floundered in the face of our democratic friends, and already they read the hand writing on the wall with grave apprehension. While there are a few bruises that have a little soreness yet, as a whole, the Burkholder delegation has consigned itself to its fate, submitted to the inevitable, and is now in line to fight as loyally for the "other fellow" as they would have fought for their choice. Let us lay aside every prejudice; let us cast into the abyss of forgetfulness all personalities; let us all strike out to accomplish something in the next two years that will have a tendency to pull the east and west delegations together, that when the next county convention meets we may present a solid front. When we shall have attained a solid front and shall go to Eugene as a unit, then shall we be able to accomplish something for this section of Lane county, as well as demand the respect of other delegates. It is not wise to fight among ourselves. It is only by almost heroic effort that men tangled in political squabbles, control their passions and remain normal. It is like a disease. Remove the cause and the disease will succumb to treatment. Let us not only remove the cause by being manly men, but wipe out the disease by fair and honorable treatment. With the best of feelings toward all, with malice toward none, the Nugget stands ready to fight loyally for county and state ticket, placing party interests before personalities and pride.

HON. THOS. H. TONGUE.
