

SURVEY OF NEW ROAD.
F. H. Rogers returned home from a trip to Coos county, Sunday evening. From him we learn that a party of surveyors had surveyed a route for a railroad from Coos bay to Winchester bay on the Umpqua, and were then at work between the latter place and Gardner. They informed him that they have instructions to extend the survey through to Florence, and expect a portion of the road will be built this summer. The work is being done under the direction of A. M. Simpson, the lumber king, who owns a large tract of timber land between Coos bay and the Umpqua, and another large tract between Gardner and Florence. The road is to be a standard gauge, and while one object of Mr. Simpson is probably to transport his timber, it is thought that the line will be extended to an eastern connection.—Florence West.

CHANGES IN FOOTBALL RULES.
A number of representatives from different colleges in the east have agreed on some radical changes in the rules of football. The most important revision was a rule providing that the opposing team should change sides after each touch down scored or field goal kicked. The other radical change is in the kicking of the goal from touchdown. The new rule provides for the bringing out of the ball as heretofore to kicking distance, say 20 yards from the goal posts; that this point shall be a line of scrimmage and the try for the goal can be made by snapping the ball either for a place kick or a drop kick behind the line of scrimmage.

A SUBSTANTIAL BUILDING.
The construction work on Dr. Geo. Wall's new office building on the corner of Second and Main streets is going rapidly forward, under the supervision of J. H. Warner. The frame work is now nearly up and in the course of three or four weeks it will be ready for occupancy. The foundation is stone 2x340 feet. The structure is known as veneer brick, and will be one of the handsomest buildings in town when completed. The doctor will occupy the upper story himself, which will be fitted with the most modern equipment. The lower floor will be for rent.

DOWN A BANK.
While Dr. Anderson was riding to Amos last Saturday his pony became scared by a school boy who suddenly appeared in a bend in the road with a shining dinner bucket. The horse wheeled and slid down a ten foot bank at the side of the road. The doctor managed to keep his seat, however, and after a long yard run stopped the frightened animal. He dismounted and laid in the shade for some time, suffering from his terrific shaking up and bruises. Finally he got aboard the hurricane deck of his broom and completed his journey returning home that evening tired, sick and bruised.

A. M. WHITE TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

TEMPORARY INSANITY CAUSE OF RASH DEED.

Deceased a Part Owner of the Bohemia Saloon of this Place and Well Known Here.

Word reached this city Wednesday morning that A. M. White, partner of Lee Minard in the Bohemia saloon, had been found near Goshen with a bullet in his head.
For some time past Mr. White had been drinking hard and his friends had not considered his mind right for nearly a year.
Only a few months ago he married Miss Etta Spong of this city, and it is said that his frequent periods of intoxication caused the lady to leave him and return to her parents.
White's body was found early Wednesday morning by a man by the name of Lotman on the side of the hill back of A. L. Rooney's residence and near where the county rock crusher is at work. It was not known who the dead man was for a while, but it soon became known that it was A. M. White who had been staying with his friend, Bert Nunn, at Goshen since Monday night.
White, who was a partner with Lee Minard in the Bohemia saloon at Cottage Grove, was married on May 7th at the Hotel Eugene to Miss Etta Spong, a young lady of Cottage Grove. Since their marriage it seems that they have had trouble and his wife has been at Drain for some time. During the last few days White has seemed to be mentally unbalanced, his mind being affected from the trouble with his wife and probably from hard drinking. He was in Eugene Monday and seemed to be deranged at that time, and told several friends of his troubles. He went to Goshen Monday night and stayed at the home of the man formerly city marshal of Cottage Grove. Mr. Nunn says that last night White would not sleep in the house, but asked for some blankets and took them out to the hill where he was found dead this morning with a bullet-hole through his head, having shot himself with a revolver, the bullet entering the right temple. Indications pointed to the belief that he killed himself about daylight this morning.

THE CORONER'S INQUIRY.
Coroner Griffin returned to Eugene late this afternoon. After examining several witnesses the jury impaneled rendered the following verdict:
GOSHEN, Or., June 25, 1902.
We, the coroner's jury impaneled in the case of A. M. White, deceased, of Cottage Grove, Oregon, who was found dead on the south hillside in V. B. Matthews' pasture at Goshen, Oregon, on the morning of June 25, 1902, after viewing the remains and listening to the testimony adduced in the case, find that the deceased came to his death by a pistol shot fired into his own head by his own hand sometime during the night of June 24, 1902.
We, the coroner's jury, foreman: A. L. ROSEY, M. D. DONITY, W. R. DILLARD, W. B. EMMS, J. M. BERSHIRE.
The funeral was held at the residence of deceased under the auspices of the Redmen lodge and the body was laid away in the Masonic-Odd Fellows cemetery.
