

PROGRESS OF BOHEMIA RAILROAD

TO BE BUILT TO RESERVE IMMEDIATELY.

Arrangements Now Complete and No Delay Will Be Experienced.

General Manager W. F. Morphy is authority for the statement that there will be no delay in the construction of the Oregon & Southern line to Bohemia.

The first 10 miles will be completed on time, and the grading gang will be retained and the next twelve miles graded as fast as possible. The only thing to be determined now is the time in which it will take the contractors to complete the work.

The completion of the next twelve miles will bring the road to the reserve.

It is unofficially announced that the right of way through the reserve will be granted, which will enable the company to reach the proposed terminus at an early date.

Right of Way Assured.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—R. J. Jennings, of Portland, who has been in Washington for several days with business before the Interior Department, left yesterday, assured that a right of way will be granted for the Oregon & Southern Railroad into the Cascade forest reserve for a sufficient distance to give adequate outlet to the mines in the Bohemia Mining District. The right of way will be secured under a recent act of congress. The proposed line will be 38 miles long, connecting with the Southern Pacific.

NEW IMPROVEMENTS IN COTTAGE GROVE

MANY NEW RESIDENCES AND BUSINESS HOUSES.

An Unprecedented Growth in the City—Carpenters, Painters and Paper-hangers Rushed—Building Material Slow.

Never in the history of Cottage Grove has so many improvements been put under way and planned as is apparent this season. Today the business houses are being rushed on Main street as follows: Dr. Wall's new office 25x40 feet, two stories; Wheeler & Phillips 25x60, two stories; and the new furniture store owned by Martin and Jenkins & Lawson. The building will be 30x90 feet when completed.

On River street The Pacific Timber Co. are building a two story wagon and blacksmith shop and lumber room 25x200 feet. This building extends along the river bank and will present a fine appearance.

The L. O. O. F. addition which will be used by The Pacific Timber Co. is now nearly completed. This building is 25x40 and will front on River street, giving the store a south and west frontage.

The new dry kiln of Abrams and Thomas is completed and is filled with lumber night and day.

Monday the S. P. Co. unloaded its first shipment of lumber for the new depot, and it is understood that work will commence on the splendid structure in a couple of weeks.

The frame work for the Long & Blighman saw mill is now nearly up and it is understood that the mill will be ready to run in thirty days.

On the West side Frank Miller is erecting a substantial upright to his dwelling 14x24, story and a half.

C. E. Walker has a nice residence under construction, main part 16x24 with wing 14x22, brick foundation.

There are a number of other improvements also under construction and many more planned, which shows the progress that is now being made in the gateway city of Bohemia.
