ADVANCE IN PRICES.

Binder Twine Market Rises Half a Cent and Is Still on the Up Grade.

Confirming predictions in our former comments on Binding Twine, prices have advanced one-half cent per pound on all grades. This advance is made on the arrong position of the fiber market, and indications are that present prices will be maintained, although even higher prices may precail in the very near future.

Consumption will be larger than anticipated as, from farm papers of the Mississippi valley, a larger amount of twine than usual will be required for the out harvest, an increase of at least 25 per cent by most conservative esti-mate. indicates that home manufacutrers are well prepared to take care of the market section, and native pride would dictate that, other things being equal, home products should be given preference. 
