### Mines and Mining

Devoted to Bohemia Notes and Items of general interest to Mining Men.

**Well Known Here.**  
The following article is from the editorial page of the New England Journal for Investors, published at Boston, Mass., and which devoted many pages to the Bohemia Mining District, of its issue of July 5. The gentlemen referred to are well known here, and their western friends will be pleased to learn that they are so pleasantly spoken of abroad:  
"The great Bohemia Mining District of Oregon is attracting much attention throughout the country at the present time, and seems destined to become one of the famous gold producers of the times. Its importance must be recognized by mining men and investors, and accordingly the Journal for Investors has devoted much space to it this week, offering besides a special article by Mr. George W. Lloyd of this city, the copy of a contribution by Mr. James P. Kimball in the Mining and Engineering Journal. Both gentlemen are authorities on mining matters."  
Mr. Lloyd is a Massachusetts boy, but went west over 25 years ago, and has grown up with the country. He located in Iowa in 1876, and engaged in railroad work for the ensuing four years. In 1880 he went to Leadville, Colo., and there, associating himself with Mr. Charles J. Moore, began the practice of mining engineering. Until two years ago he resided in Colorado, and at least three-fourths of his time has been employed in mining litigation. During the past 20 years there have been but few important mining suits that he has not been connected with. His attention was called to the Bohemia Mining District nearly three years ago. He visited the district in August 1899, and after a careful examination made up his mind that it would in time rival Cripple Creek in its yearly production. He was impressed with the strong fissure veins traversing the district, and he at once saw that the precipitous hillsides offered exceptional opportunities for tunnel work, thus doing away with expensive machinery for hoisting and pumping purposes. Today Mr. Lloyd is laud in his praises of the district.

Mr. James P. Kimball is also a native of the Bay state. He was born in Salem, April 26, 1836, and was educated at the Lawrence scientific school of Harvard, the universities of Berlin and Göttingen, and the Freiberg school of mining. Subsequently he followed a practical course in engineering, mining and metallurgy at Freiberg, Saxony. On his return to the United States he became connected with the state geological surveys of Wisconsin and Illinois. He was professor of chemistry and economic geology at the New York state agricultural college at Ovid in 1861-2, and then became assistant adjutant general of volunteers, with the rank of captain. In this capacity he served during the Civil war as chief of staff to Gen. Marsena R. Patrick, participating in the campaigns of the army of the Potomac. He afterwards served on the general staff under McClellan, Burnside, Hooker and Meade, successively. Failing health led to his resignation from the army in 1863, and then making New York City his residence he resumed the practice of his profession. In 1874 he became honorary professor of geology at Lehigh university, and thenceforth until 1885 resided at Bethlehem, Pa. He was appointed in June, 1885, director of the United States mint, at the head of a bureau in Washington, under the control of which all the mints and assay offices of the United States were placed in 1873. Dr. Kimball is a member of scientific societies, and was vice-president of the American Institute of Mining Engineers in 1881-2.

**Hiawatha**  
Mr. J. C. Johnson, secretary of the Hiawatha Mining and Milling Co., returned from Bohemia Saturday evening after a two weeks tour of the district, with Mr. A. P. King, a mining man of San Jose, Calif. These gentlemen visited all of the principal mines as well as many of the prospects of the camp and in an interview with a representative of the Nugget reports great activity throughout the entire district.  
While building a trail a few days ago Supt. Russell uncovered a vein of fine milling ore on a vacant piece of ground adjoining the company's property on the north and located and named the same the Hiawatha Fracture. This exceedingly rich vein added to the company's valuable properties gives them in all four veins of free ore. Work on this property is now progressing rapidly, four feet being added to the tunnel being driven directly on the vein which shows at the opening to be about 18 feet wide.  
A good crew of men are at work on the Hiawatha, and since operations commenced on this company's property June 1st a fine showing has been made, about a mile and a half of first class trail has been made, over sixty feet of tunnel has been driven on the main ledge, and last week broke into a very large rich free milling chute of ore, the extent of which is impossible to say at this time.  
At the LeRoy camp a crew of 12 men are at work repairing and excavating preparatory to the installation of machinery recently ordered which will arrive about the 25th of this month. A new level has been started on this property opening up a large ore chute showing better ore than ever before brought to light on this property. Mr. King expresses his belief that the LeRoy property is the biggest and best thing in the camp, the big strong veins showing such good values in ore, unlimited, insures to this company large dividends for years to come; the great depth that can be obtained by tunnelling, thereby avoiding expensive pumping and hoisting machinery and the great timber and water facilities on the property, allow the company to mine their ores at very small expense.

**Famous Old Knott Mine.**  
"Dug" Ladd, the manager of the famous old Knott mine on Grouse mountain, Bohemia, this week let a contract to Carl Coats which goes into effect next week. The work will be done on the shaft which was sunk two years ago. When the shaft was sunk to its present depth of 55 feet, 80 feet from the old shaft from which thousands of dollars was taken, they struck immense quantities of rich gold bearing ore. It is the intention of the owners to go down 50 feet further and then cross-cut to determine the width of the ledge. Mr. Coats will commence work next week, and will push the work with all possible speed. It is the intention of the owners to put a mill on the property next year.  
**Found Croppings.**  
The Judson Rock people are highly elated over a recent finding on the Pilot Boy claim. As the contractors were going down to the big tunnel to commence work about a week ago Dan Colton picked up some float which looked "good to him," upon panning it was found good. After consulting Col. Blair of this city it was determined to go in on the croppings and find out what they had there. Tuesday Col. Blair received a Peccotobacco sack filled with the ore from the first shot. He took one-fourth of it and panned it Wednesday morning and got almost a quarter of a teaspoonful of gold. This cropping is that of the main ledge about 300 feet above the big tunnel which is now being driven.

**New Mining Company.**  
At the county clerk's office in Corvallis, The Great Eastern Mining Company has filed articles of incorporation. The incorporators are Horace Lilly, T. H. Wells, August W. Fisher, W. W. Calkins, George Lilly, A. K. Milner and Lewis Hartley. The capital stock is \$1,250,000, divided into 1,250,000 shares at \$1 each. Nine hundred thousand shares are to be issued to the incorporation, to be paid for in full by deed to said incorporation of certain mines owned by the incorporators in proportion to the value agreed upon by said incorporators. The remaining 350,000 shares are to be sold under the direction of the board of directors, and the proceeds thereof are to be used in the prosecution of the business of the corporation. The principal office is to be at Corvallis, Oregon. The duration of the incorporation is to be indefinite. Lewis Hartley, whose name appears in the above article, is well known in Bohemia District and has some valuable mining property. The Nugget wishes the new company all possible success.

**Oregon and Colorado.**  
F. J. Hard, the well known mining man and secretary of the Oregon Mining Exchange, as well as manager of the Oregon and Colorado Mining Co., was in the city this week from his camp near Burnett's where his family is conveniently camped for the summer. Mr. Hard is now looking after the development work of the Oregon and Colorado and speaks very confidently of the company's immediate prospects, as well as most enthusiastically of the district. The company has now a full crew of men at work, and they are now in 278 feet on the main tunnel, against ore that is highly satisfactory. Surveyor Collier in this week surveying the road running from the mine to intersect the main road on the west side of Grouse mountain, the object being to have everything in readiness to put ore on the cars as soon as the road reaches the edge of the district, and Mr. Hard says that time cannot come too quick to suit him or his company.  
**The Vesuvius.**  
Mr. Hard is also one of the heavy owners of the famous Vesuvius which is known far and near as one of the finest properties in Bohemia. Speaking about the Vesuvius Mr. Hard states that as soon as Surveyor Collier can get to it an underground survey of the mine will be made, upon the completion of which a full crew of men will be put to work and continuous development will be the order of the day.  
**The Golden Slipper.**  
Dr. Oglesby of Junction returned this week from a trip into the Golden Slipper, where the company has a crew working in the Dewey tunnel since March. Dr. Oglesby states that they have very desirable results at present which were unlooked for. From the facing up of the Dewey tunnel they have been in base ore, but a few days ago at a depth of about 750 feet they broke into a three foot vein of rich free milling ore, in appearance like the black ore found many years ago in the Noonday. Dr. Oglesby states that it leaves a streak of the yellow stuff clear around the pan.  
**The Crystal.**  
F. D. Wheeler and Frank Jordan, officers of the Crystal Consolidated Mining Co., have just returned from an extended inspection of the property. They report work progressing rapidly. On the Lake property the company is working a double shift of men, on the new tunnel, which is now in 50 feet. This tunnel will tap the main ledge at the depth of 800 or 1000 feet. The width of the ledge is not as yet known, as a crosscut has not been made, but the ore is remarkably good and results from the pan are highly pleasing to the company. They expect to make a crosscut next week when the exact width of the ledge will be known. The company has just uncovered another strong lead on this property which is showing up splendidly. The company has made another location the croppings of which show good galena ore. From the mouth of the new tunnels a continuous ledge can be traced 2700 feet and on this ledge the company has in the aggregate 600 feet of tunnels which expose large ore bodies. When 100 feet shall have been gained on the new tunnel a crosscut will be made tapping the other lead, which also runs the entire length of two claims, the Elcalado and Mountain Lion. Negotiations are now being made with San Francisco parties for the purchase of machinery suitable for the treatment of the ore. The outlook is very flattering and the company expects big results this season.  
**Mining Notes.**  
Contract work on the Judson Rock, Champion, Knott, Riverside and Ely properties is being pushed with all speed.  
Many persons are now in the district with a view of buying promising properties, and a number of sales are being consummated.  
Individual owners of prospects throughout the entire camp are developing their claims to an extent never before known in the district.  
At the Musick a large force of men are at work stopping out ore. The stamp mill is receiving a thorough overhauling, and will be in operation in the near future.  
On the claims adjoining the LeRoy property on the west, the Crystal Consolidated Co. have a crew of men drifting on the ore vein which is an extension of the LeRoy lead, showing up some very fine ore.  
The echoing of the heavy blasts from every side, the dropping of the stamps in the several mines, the large number of people eagerly searching for new discoveries shows to the observer that Bohemia is at last taken on the busy hum of industry that will soon bring it to its proper standing as the richest mining camp in the Northwest.  
F. J. Hard, secretary of the Oregon Mining Exchange, left today for the Bohemia District, where he expects to remain during the greater part of the summer. He will return to Portland each week, however, and spend one day here out of the week. Mr. Hard is owner of the Riverside and Vesuvius claims, on which he expects to do considerable work this summer.—Portland Journal, July 5.
