One of the essential features that is necessary to be introduced into the municipal administration of this city at the present time is a method by which the hobo class that occasionally blots this way may be made to earn the city a little something, and at the same time keep their disagreeable presence from the streets. It has been suggested by this paper on more than one occasion that a shed should be erected over a pile of rock. This will keep the knights of the road from getting sleepy and their muscles from getting stiff. There are many ways to utilize this floating force to the advantage of the town they infest and it is no more than right that the city take advantage of it. In Eugene they have a rock shed, and when the weather is unfit for street work they are set to pounding rock. Another thing: The municipal government should not be afraid to impose heavy time sentences. When this is done and the bum class of humanity discover that a throw-in in Cottage Grove means from 30 to 60 days at hard work they will stay clear of the town, and that is the main motive. All that is required is a little firmness, and the proper authority vested in the marshal, without which authority he is an officer in name only and is always at an uncalculated and unnecessary disadvantage.

Every mining man going in and visiting the Bohemia Mining District, upon his return to Cottage Grove, speaks in most flattering terms of the district, and the fine showing of the properties brought to his attention while there, expressing surprise that a district of so promising a nature should be covered up and the unknown to the mining world so many years. Indeed, it is difficult to explain; but one of the principal reasons is found in the fact that only a few years ago it was generally thought that Oregon contained no mineral wealth to speak of. The average mining man was brought up in the belief that the gold-bearing quartz of material value was to be found only in such states as Montana, Colorado, California, etc., and it always takes about so long for ideas of that kind to be dispelled. Today we see a change. Oregon is taking its place in the front rank of mineral bearing states, and Bohemia Mining District is known and being talked east, west, north and south.

The accident to Young Olsen, who had his arm crushed until amputation was necessary last Thursday morning while attempting to board the construction train of the O. & S. E. Ry., should be taken seriously by other employees of the company. The railroad operators do not wish men to take any chances, and if they do, it cannot be otherwise construed than carelessness on their part. Don't take chances boys. Crushed and mangled limbs are had enough, but some of you will not get off as easily as that. Your life is at stake. Remember that moving railroad trains are dangerous.

The splendid showing of the various properties in Bohemia, especially the LeRoy, Judson Rock, Hiawatha, Crystal, Musick, Knott and Golden Slipper is indeed gratifying to the mine owners of the district. They find that to nearly all of these properties rich chutes of free milling ore are occasionally broken into, of much value to the property owners. While it is conceded that the district, properly speaking, is base, the striking of rich veins of free milling ore is very gratifying at this stage of development.

Baker county mine owners are taking steps to advertise the mineral resources of their county by sending a man east with a rich mineral exhibit who will deliver illustrated lectures before various educational bodies throughout the east with a view of interesting capital in the same. Perhaps some such concerted action on the part of the mine owners of Lane county would result in interesting more capital than could be done in years of correspondence.

In order to determine the business condition of Cottage Grove it is only necessary for one to drop off here and take a look at the improvements now being made. Cottage Grove is destined to be a big thrifty town. It is not claimed that it will ever surpass Eugene. It is not necessary. Eugene is third to no town in the state, and it will be reputation enough for Cottage Grove to know that it is rated as next Eugene.

Miners Organize.

Mention was made in our columns some time ago of the feeling in Josephine county against the timber locators who were locating timber claims right and left down there regardless of the amount of timber on the same if the mineral prospects were good. A mass meeting was held at the court house here on July 7th and an organization perfected for the protection of the mineral lands from the timber locator. The meeting was an enthusiastic one as will be seen by the following from the Oregon Mining Journal:
"Addressees were made stating the object of and the necessity for united action to preserve the mineral land for the prospector and miner. Instances were shown where mines which have been worked for years have been filed on by timber locators, but fortunately discovered in time for the owner to file a protest. It was also stated that in some instances locations have been made in mineral regions, where in some cases there was not timber enough on the ground to fence the claim. The sentiment of the meeting was voiced by several speakers who stated that there was no objection whatever to the location of timber claims on timber lands, but as the mineral industry is paramount to all others it was necessary to take united action to keep the same open to the prospector.
