MINE CAVERS IN.

One of the tunnels at the Lucky Boy mine, in the Blue River district, caved in last Saturday, and a number of miners narrowly escaped with their lives. For months the miners have been engaged in the work of "stopping" in the main tunnel. The miners became alarmed about the safety of the broad, high walls, and reported to the manager their fears. At 11 o'clock Saturday all the miners left the tunnel and held a consultation regarding its probable safety. Not being satisfied, a committee of the most experienced men entered the tunnel to make a further examination. They had no more than entered the tunnel when the walls collapsed with a terrific crash. The men were thrown out of the tunnel by the concussion, and thus escaped without injury. The tunnel is now a mass of debris, and the loss to the company is very heavy, although difficult to estimate. The company has not yet decided what course to pursue.

BIG COMBINATION FOR BOHEMIA

FIVE MILLION DOLLAR COMBINE FORMED LAST WEEK.

Helena, Musick and Calapooia Companies Absorbed—Control 31 Claims, Comprising 700 Acres of Land.

The definite news of the recent consolidation of the Helena Consolidated Mining and Milling Co., the Calapooia Mining and Tunnel Co. and the Musick Mining and Milling Co. has created quite a little excitement in the Bohemia district and is causing a considerable advance in Cottage Grove realty.

These three properties are, under the new corporation, known as the Oregon Securities Co., incorporated under the laws of New Jersey with a capital stock of \$5,000,000 fully paid and non-assessable. The Helena company is a well known dividend payer while the Musick has a producing record of \$200,000 and has always been considered one of the best pieces of property in the district.

The new corporation is composed of capitalists of ability and energy and coupled with their judgment in investments, their taking hold of Bohemia property will prove substantial benefit to the entire Oregon mining interest as well as Bohemia property. The officers of the new company are: P. J. Jennings, Pres.; Albert Hawkins 1st Vice President; George W. Crosby, 2nd Vice President; G. B. Hengen, Secretary and Treasurer; John H. Pearsons, Asst. Hengen, New York, president of Hengen Investment Co.; John H. Pearsons, New York, Asst. Secretary and director Oregon & South-Eastern Railroad Co. also connected with several prominent mining companies.
