An Appreciative Letter. July 28, 1902. Hon. R. Job, Mayor of Cottage Grove, Oregon. Dear Sir: Upon my return from the trip over our lines with Immigration Agent McKinney and his men, I take the first opportunity to write you and thank you for the personal interest you took in our visit to Cottage Grove recently, and through you to thank the others for the encouragement given by the interest displayed in the matter of immigration. We found the people of every place very much alive to their interests on these lines and a unit in the matter of working and co-operating with us. Mr. McKinney and his men were so favorably impressed with our people and country that I am sure they will go back east talking Western Oregon in preference to any other portion of the northwest. I presume you have noticed in the papers the announcement made by the Harriman Lines of low one-way rates to Oregon in September and October next, the Portland rates applying to all of our points. Our immigration force will go into the field in time to work up a large travel with the aid of these low rates, and I look for an influx of people next fall such as has never been known before in Oregon. I beg to call your attention to the importance of getting our advertising matter in the field at the earliest possible moment in order to take advantage of the large travel which these low rates will induce to the northwest. I shall devote my particular efforts to the question of immigration and shall be glad to co-operate with you in every way. We will endeavor to look after the people at Portland who desire to see the country tributary to our lines, and I would sug-

gest that you either appoint a committee or arrange with some of your thoroughly reliable real estate men to welcome the new comers upon their arrival, to see that they are given the desired information and made to feel that some interest is taken in having them locate amongst us. This I believe to be an important part of the immigration work. In many cases we will be in position to send the people to you with letters as we will get in touch with them through our Immigration Bureau.

I am going to give every one all the opportunity necessary to look over the country, and will allow homeseekers coming out on low rate tickets to stop off enroute from Portland south as many times as desired, and with the privilege of staying 10 days at each place, thus giving them plenty of time. Again thanking your people for the cordial reception given us upon our trip, and sincerely hoping that your section will derive its full share of the benefits to come from this immigration work, I beg to remain, Yours Very Truly, W. LeRoy Stock Advances.

At a meeting of the directors of the LeRoy Mining Company held at Eugene last Monday some important business was transacted, among which was the advancement of the stock from 10 to 15 cents per share. This company was incorporated on the 10th of last October with a capital stock of \$300,000 divided into 3,000,000 shares of 10 cents each. The raise to 15 cents means much to the many stockholders at this place and is only a fore-runner of what the future will bring forth within a few short months.

This well-known group consists of seven claims of well-defined ledges pronounced by mining experts and those familiar with the district, to be some of the richest in the entire diggings.

The new 35 horse power engine, air compressor, drills and necessary equipment are expected to be in place within the next thirty days, when tunneling will progress at the rate of from 5 to 10 feet per day instead of from 1 to 2 as at present.

This property is certainly forging rapidly to the front and another advance in stock will not surprise those who are watching things closely.

F. J. Hard, of Portland, Secretary of the Oregon Mining Stock Exchange returned home from the Bohemia district recently, and has the following to say of the district, according to the Telegram: "The Bohemia district is humming. There are about 50 properties rapidly undergoing development work making the district present a scene of great activity. Supplies cannot be freighted into camp fast enough to meet the demands of the miners. Passengers who go by stage line have to book their passage days ahead. It is decidedly encouraging to see the first ten miles of the new railroad completed from Cottage Grove, and it will be hauling ore and freight from Bedrock in a few days. "Members of the Crystal Consolidated company are in San Francisco purchasing a complete outfit for a stamp mill which will be put to work just as soon as possible on a good grade of free-milling ore. "The Oregon-Colorado are putting in an air plant, and as soon as completed the big tunnel will be entered and work pushed as rapidly as three shifts of men can work. The tunnel is now in 300 feet. A wagon road has been surveyed from the property, and will be finished in time to haul ore when the railroad reaches its terminal. "Both the Helena and Musick stamp mills are running. The management of the Vesuvius has begun work, and will put in a stamp mill for the treatment of its immense tonnage of free-milling ore now in sight, that is, as soon as the management can determine the best process whereby all the values can be saved. This company has begun proceedings for a United States patent. The Judeon Rock Company re-

ports a rich strike, and the same can be said of a number of other properties, namely Mayflower, Champion, North Fairview, Hoffman, Nott and also Superintendent E. Hines, of the Glenwood property, who has been working on it for a number of years, and who reports having entered good ore. "The Great Eastern Company, recently organized, taking in the Hartley claims on China creek, report a strike of great dimensions, equally as good, if not exceeding, anything yet found in the district. Other properties being actively and intelligently worked are the Hlawathas, Sweepstake, Plato, Stocks & Harlow, Golden Slipper, Shane, Whipple Bros., Sears, Three Monte, Oliver Twist, Broadway, Nemo, Big Rock, Steamboat, Belcher, Starr, Consolidation, Brand, Curran and probably as many more, for, in fact, one cannot travel but a few yards in the space 4 1/2 miles comprising the Bohemia District without finding work going on."
