The Crystal Con. Mining Co.

Mining and Engineering Review, Aug. 20.

The Crystal Consolidated properties embrace some of the best in the district. An investigation of several of the claims warrant the assertion that the majority are so situated that development is easy by tunnels, thus doing away with expensive machinery, and that every line of transportation for all purposes will be so complete that this company, after sufficient exploitation and development, will meet necessary requirements—ship in and place upon certain of the claims the most approved kinds of mining machinery for drilling and milling the ore. The company owns several claims, 140 acres in the vicinity of the LeRoy, Helena and Champton properties, where a large amount of development has been done and splendid results obtained. The ledges coursing through all the Crystal Consolidated are true, as are all in the district according to the reports of the best geologists of the United States.

The Eva J. Group of three claims is 4,500 feet or more than three-fourths of a mile in length, showing a distinct vein from which assays in gold, silver, lead and copper have been had. Work done on the group amounts to over 500 feet and values to \$20,850 to the ton have been had. The Transvaal claim is in Champton creek, near the northerly end of the

district, where the telephone line and the railroad cross them. The large and well defined vein carries gold, copper and lead and is prospected by a 50-foot tunnel. LAUNDRY LICENSE.

The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove at its meeting Sept. 1st passed a laundry ordinance establishing the rate of laundry license at \$20 per quarter. The ordinance provides in substance that any person, firm, company, etc., soliciting, receiving or handling clothes or other articles in the corporate limits to be laundered outside the corporate limits, or who shall engage in the business of receiving or delivering any such clothes or other articles after the same have been laundered outside the city, without first having obtained a license therefor, upon conviction shall be fined in the sum of \$10 or imprisoned in the city jail five days for each offense.

GRINDING NIGHT AND DAY.—J. H. Parsial, our "jolly miller," received another car of wheat from down the valley the first of the week and has been making a night and day run since, and then can scarcely keep a sack of any kind of stuff in the mill over night.
