## Mines and Mining

Devoted to Bohemia Notes and Items of general interest to Mining Men.

### BOHEMIA'S DISPLAY AT BUTTE.

As Seen By the Correspondent of The Butte Miner—Center of Attraction—Much Interest Manifested.

The Butte Miner of Sept. 6th devotes several columns to the display of Bohemia at that place and the district in general. The headlines displayed are as follows: "The Richest Part of Oregon"; "Bohemia Mining District One of the Latest Discoveries of the State"; "Assays Run Very High"; "Topographical Map of the District Shown at Mineral Exhibit at Columbia Gardens Attracted Great Attention." Following the above is an extended writup of which the following is a portion:

"One of the most unique displays in the mineral exhibit at Columbia gardens, and which has attracted more than ordinary attention, was that constituted by the relief map of the Bohemia Mining District of Oregon, together with specimens of ore from a number of the claims. The exhibition was in personal charge of F. G. Eby, secretary and treasurer of the Le Roy Mining Company.

Mr. Eby says that the Bohemia Mining District is one of the new discoveries in Oregon, and from the assays already made warrants the assertion that it will rival the greatest camps of the great northwest. The relief map on exhibition shows the topography of the district complete in every detail, and includes all the mineral claims that have been taken up to date, together with all the streams which afford abundant water for all mining purposes."

### Pleased With Bohemia.

Oregonian, Sept. 10.—P. R. Day, a Hartford, Conn. capitalist, who has just returned from a week's visit to the Bohemia mines, says that the Bohemia District is one of the most promising mining sections of the United States, not even excepting Colorado. He thinks the people of Oregon do not begin to appreciate the value of their mineral resources, but that in a very short time the richness of the mines will be demonstrated. Mr. Day says he is not a mining man, but has learned something of mines through having made some unprofitable investments a few years ago. He now owns mining property in Colorado and Utah, and has just invested some money in the Bohemia District.

When seen at the Portland Hotel yesterday, Mr. Day said that the great difficulty in the Bohemia mines has been the long-distance haul of 36 miles by team, which is the only means of getting the base ores to the railroad. This distance has already been reduced 10 miles by the construction of a railroad, and by February 1 he thinks the road will be completed nearly to the mines. When that is accomplished, he thinks the cost of transporting the ore will be reduced to one-fifth, and perhaps one-tenth of what it is now, and the value of the mining property will be doubled.

"That the quantity of paying ore is practically inexhaustible, he has no doubt, after having inspected some of the mines now in operation. The surface of only a few claims has scarcely been scratched, yet," he said, "and some of the mines are paying development work alone. Exhaustible! Why, your grandchildren will be receiving dividends from the mining operations in Bohemia district."

Mr. Day left last evening for his home in Hartford, greatly enthused with the bright outlook for mining in Oregon in the future.

### Purchase Mining Claims.

The "Ibex" and "Buffalo" mining claims at the foot of Hardscrabble Ridge on the Sharp's Creek trail into the Bohemia district were purchased this week from their former owner, W. W. Hawley, by C. L. Johnson and Wm. Wechter of Salem, who already have a group of six or seven claims adjacent to them. In this sale is also included the hotel and commodious barn situated on the property and familiar to everybody passing over this road, to or from the district. These gentlemen are practical, experienced mining men, hence know a good thing when they see it and are not slow to act.

### BOHEMIA MINING DISTRICT.

As Seen by the Mining and Engineer's Review.

The Bohemia mining region was, according to tradition, discovered by Dr. W. W. Johnson of Oregon City and Frank Brass in August, 1858. James Johnson and George Ramsey reached it in 1853 and free gold was then found near headwaters of City Creek. The discovery brought many prospectors to the Calapooia mountains. Johnson was a Bohemian by birth and from this fact was the district so named. Their finds were reported to be marvelous of richness. It is supposed their first gold was found upon the claim known as the "Mystery" and now a portion of the holdings of the Oregon Securities Company. Today interest regarding early knowledge of the Bohemia district centers in the doings of a Mr. Knott, who, in 1875, more than ten years after gold was first discovered, transported a five stamp mill over a road made from Frank Brass creek up onto the top of the divide, following the ridge for many miles and finally, after a great many trials and hardships, it was placed in position on the Knott claims on Grouse mountain. The mill was run at intervals for two or three years when interest in the district virtually dwindled away. A revival began in 1890 when two prospectors, Joseph Kennedy and O. P. Adams, went to prospecting to find the gold they had for years contended existed in those mountains. Since that time prospecting and developing of properties has been going on steadily. To Messrs. J. W. Cook and A. E. Davis of Los Angeles, Col. O. E. Brady of San Francisco and J. W. Musick, a prospector of many years' experience in Arizona, California and Oregon, can much of the early development and knowledge of the district be credited. It was in the spring of 1892 they contracted for a 5-stamp mill. A great many difficulties attended the shipment of the boiler, engine and other machinery of this plant in sections over the steep, rocky and arduous trail to the Los Angeles and Defiance claims, now known as the Musick mine. In October of that year the mill was ready to start, and the stamps began to drop, and it being the winter season, with a scarcity of supplies, only a nine days' run was had; the clean up amounted to \$4,000 from selected ore. As one reads the record of events it seems that work of development and improvement for years was only desultory, for in 1893 the mill was run, off and on, the fall cleanup netted \$11,000. In 1894 over \$5,000 was spent in dead work, the mill run occasionally from May till November and the clean up was \$13,000. The result of the clean up for 1895 was \$14,498. From May, 1896, until February, 1897, \$17,137.10. For the same period of the year following the clean up was \$35,873.25. During all this time much prospecting was going on for miles around. The Champion put in a 10-stamp mill in 1895 and the Noonday a 20-stamp mill in 1896. After the Sharps creek road was built in 1898 many more active and enterprising men entered the districts and systematic development went rapidly forward. The road before that time only went as far as Hawleys, a distance about half way from Cottage Grove to the Musick mine. In the summer of 1898 the county contributed \$700, and the Bohemia Gold Mine and Mill Company (the Musick mine) and the prospectors in general chipped in the remainder and the road was built up Sharps creek. It then follows in a wonderful winding way for five and a half miles on the steep sides of Fairview mountain right up the sharp point of Bohemia peak and for the distance mentioned the grade is a strong ten per cent per mile.

What does the writer think of the district in a general way? As a representative of mining papers he has during the last twelve years visited the leading camps of British Columbia, Idaho, Oregon, California, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah and Colorado. As regards Cripple Creek, many characteristics are similar. Outside of that the Bohemia Mining District compares principally with those of Rossland, B. C., and the great San Juan of Colorado. No one to his knowledge ever saw two districts entirely similar, even if only ten miles apart. Many a well qualified and educated mining expert has visited

the district and who of all of them has said a word derogatory? Professors representing the U. S. geological survey, mining engineers and metallurgists have traversed its steep mountain sides and penetrated the excesses made by tunnels and other underground workings and all have declared that true fissure ledges trend all through for miles, principally in a direction northwest and southeast, dipping south and southwest and occasionally dipping rather to the north. The future mining situation of the Bohemia District may be indicated by what a prominent woman once remarked, "When electricity is called to its aid, as it is now carried across the Rockies from Butte to Anaconda 5,000 volt power, mining will become like manufacturing;" and so when the Oregon Securities Company installs a mammoth electrical plant on Clampon creek, probably at the Warehouse, power will be transmitted to all available points in the Bohemia district and mining then will be as easy as manufacturing.

### The Golden Rule.

C. L. Johnson and Wm. Wechter, secretary and vice-president of the Golden Rule Mining and Milling Co., were in from Bohemia Saturday. They report the company's property as showing up very well. Their reliance leads us to the old adage "Still water runs deep and you don't know what is at the bottom." They have splendid property, well located and adjoining the North Fairview Co. We trust to be able to give the public something more definite in regard to this company in the near future.

### The Great Waiki Mine.

The great Waiki gold on mine of New Zealand now operates 330 stamps, the second largest stamp equipment of the world, being exceeded only by the Alaska-Treadwell. The mine has been successfully operated, on an annually increasing scale, for about 15 years. In 1901 290 stamps crushed 159,325 tons of ore which yielded \$2,236,850. The total product to May 1902 was \$10,662,350. The deepest workings are but 643 feet and there are immense bodies of pay ore. The amount in sight was recently estimated at 628,595 tons. Dividends to date have amounted to \$4,308,395. The company has a reserve account of nearly \$500,000.
