EVENTS OF THE DAY

Comprehensive Review of the Important Happenings of the Past Week, Presented in Condensed Form, Most Likely to Prove Interesting.

A second military expedition has been sent against the Moros.

Fifteen hundred street carmen in New Orleans have struck for increased pay.

A fire at Stockton, Cal., destroyed \$500,000 worth of property. Five blocks were burned.

A Mississippi Negro, who confessed to old crime, was hanged alive. He said he deserved the fate that had overtaken him.

The president's physicians found it necessary to open the wound on his leg, as the bone was slightly affected. It is not serious and recovery will soon come.

The annual report of the commissioner of pensions shows that there are now nearly a million names on the pension rolls. The total disbursement of the department has been \$2,900,854,302.

The cable from San Francisco to Manila will be in working order by July 4, 1905, according to the officials of the company. Three steamers will lay the cable, two from Manila and one from San Francisco.

The comet discovered at Lick observatory September 1 has grown steadily brighter, until at the present time it is visible to the naked eye. It is moving in a southeasterly direction.

Dr. Silvano Brandao, vice president of Brazil, is dead.

A census of the Philippines has been authorized by the president.

No more American soldiers will be sent to the isthmus of Panama.

The presence of troops has had a quieting effect in the coal fields of Pennsylvania.

President Roosevelt's injured leg continues to improve, and the president will be around again in a few days.

Burglars in South Sharon, Pa., held up a store, overpowered, bound and gagged two officers and secured \$400.

Isaac A. Singer, one of the largest stockholders in the Singer sewing machine company, died at his home in Atlantic City.

The following diplomatic appointments have been made: David E. Thompson, of Nebraska, minister to Brazil; Charlesman Tower, of Pennsylvania, ambassador to Germany; Robert S. McCormick, of Illinois, ambassador to Russia; Bellamy Storer, of New York, ambassador to Austria-Hungary; Arthur S. Hardy, of New Hampshire, minister to Spain, and Charles P. Bryan, of Illinois, minister to Switzerland.

The emperor of Korea is dead.

Americans find the task of reducing the Moros more difficult than anticipated.

A lone highwayman near Stites, Idaho, held up a stage and secured \$500.

Henry Phipps, a New York steel magnate, has given \$100,000 for the relief of Boers.

President Roosevelt has announced his determination to visit the Pacific Coast next spring.

The cruiser San Francisco has sailed from Norfolk, Va., to Panama to protect American interests.

Five hundred riotous Berkeley, Cal., students took possession of a train and created general havoc. One arrest has been made and more will follow.

Two tramps were killed in a freight wreck on the Northwestern in Iowa.

Another call has been made on the governor of Pennsylvania for troops in the strike district.

J. P. Morgan is opposed to the re-nomination of Roosevelt, and is working hard to defeat him.

A hair and feather factory in Chicago was destroyed by fire. Several persons were overcome by smoke. Loss, \$7,000.

Hall in New Mexico stripped trees of fruit and lightning set fire to the capital, which was saved after a hard fight.

The Colombian revolution has broken out in a new place. Conditions are much disturbed on the north coast, near the mouth of the Magdalena river.

Miss Alice Caldwell Hogan, the author of that successful little story, "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch," has written her second book, and it is to appear serially in The Century. She calls it "Lover Mary," and the many admirers of Mrs. Wiggs will be glad to know that this optimistic character reappears in the new story.

A Sacramento river steamer burned at her dock in San Francisco. Several passengers were more or less severely injured.

A New York man is suing a street car company for \$5,000 on account of an accident which compelled him to shave off his whiskers.

All is in readiness at Fort Riley, Kan., for the war maneuvers.

A balloon explosion at Vienna resulted in the death of 30 persons.

Postal receipts of Oregon and Washington for the past year show a good increase.

Cholera has broken out again in Egypt and many cases are being reported daily.

Three men were badly injured by an explosion at the Willamette Iron Works in Portland.

An unsuccessful attempt was made to wreck the czar's train while he was on his way to St. Petersburg.

An electric car at Akron, Ohio, jumped the track, injuring a dozen passengers more or less severely.

KILLED FOR HIS MONEY.

Wealthy New Yorker Carelessly Displayed Large Amount of Cash.

New York, Sept. 30.—James B. Craft, a wealthy resident of Glen Cove, L. I., was murdered, and his body decapitated, in a tenderloin resort within a few doors of Broadway. All the evidence goes to show that Craft, who had been making the rounds of the tenderloin, incautiously displayed a large amount of money and was killed for the purpose of robbery. The police also say that knock-out drops were first administered, and that then the victim was dragged into the basement and killed with a cleaver.

The odor of burning flesh attracted the attention of the occupants of the upper part of the house and led to the discovery by the detectives of the headless body of a man in the basement. The charred head was discovered a few minutes later in the furnace, in which a fire had recently been made with the evident intention of destroying all possibility of identification of the remains. Later the body was identified by Walter Craft, of Glen Cove, as that of his father.

The murdered man was about 53 years of age and was a manufacturer of refrigerating machinery in Cortlandt street, this city.

MANY CORPSES RECOVERED.

But Full Extent of Sicily Disaster Cannot Yet Be Told.

London, Sept. 30.—A special dispatch from Rome, after confirming the reports that Stromboli has been in full eruption for some time, says:

"The night scene was grand, but terrifying; lava streamed down the mountain sides seaward, while huge boulders were falling into the sea fully 2 1/2 miles from the shore."

"The director of the observatory at Mount Aetna says there has been an earthquake in Sicily, but that probably there had been a submarine eruption between Stromboli and Sicily."

"One hundred and fifty corpses have been recovered at Modica. Hundreds of victims were drowned in the open country."

The whole country about Mount Aetna has suffered greatly. Mount Aetna is sending up a thick column of steam from the vicinity of the crater of 1892. Two fresh craters have opened on Stromboli since September 14.

MINES IN GOOD SHAPE.

With Return of Men, Coal Output Would Be Large as Ever.

Philadelphia, Sept. 30.—General Manager Luther, of the Philadelphia & Reading railroad company's coal property, has informed the sales department of the company that all the Reading's important mines are in fairly good condition, and that were the miners to return to work, comparatively little time will elapse before they will be turning out their normal production. It is true that several of the Reading's collieries are flooded, but these have been abandoned for a time at least. Officials of the Pennsylvania road's anthracite companies report that when the miners go back to work the collieries will be able to produce three-fourths of their normal output, and that within a week they would be in perfect shape.

EARTHQUAKES IN MEXICO.

Seventy-ton Crane Thrown from Railroad on Day.

Mexico City, Sept. 30.—Advice from Salina Cruz, the Pacific terminus of the Tehuantepec National railroad, which is being rebuilt by the English contractor, states that Tuesday no less than 75 shocks of earthquake were felt, causing much alarm. The most serious damage was done to an immense 70-ton crane used on the construction of the breaker, it being thrown from the track into the bay. A majority of the smaller cranes used on the works are also reported to have been thrown out of place.

It is probable that the construction of the artificial harbor will be delayed six months, as the crane was thrown into deep water, and it will require time to recover it.

As Bad as Siberia.

Butte, Mont., Sept. 30.—President Mayer, of the Western Federation of Miners, said here today that the condition of the camps in the Fernie, B. C., district, from which he has just returned, is as bad as Siberia. Mr. Mayer went to Fernie to investigate labor conditions. He says the mining company there owns everything in the camp. They permit the men no privileges and allow no business except under their direction. They even exercise a censorship. Mr. Mayer declares, on what his employees all read.

Death in Explosion.

McKeesport, Pa., Sept. 30.—Eight slaves, with terribly charred faces, burned bodies and terribly scorched heads, were taken to the McKeesport hospital as a result of an explosion at furnace B, of the Carnegie blast furnace plant, Duquesne, tonight. Two of the victims have since died, and there is little hope that any of the others will recover. All of those injured were caught in a blast of flames and ashes, which followed the blowing out of a belt while the men were at work.

Indians on Bad Behavior.

Santa Fe, N. M., Sept. 30.—One hundred Apache Indians from the Jicarilla reservation, in northern Rio Arriba county, are camped in the Puerco mountains, ready to go to the San Geronimo festival, at Taos Pueblo, deep to the positive orders of the agent.

Another band of Apaches is trespassing on the land of the Santa Clara and other pueblos. The U. S. Attorney has orders from Washington to return them to the reservation.

No Parcel Mail to Alaska.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The post-office department has notified all postmasters that during the winter months it will be impossible to transmit mail matter in the form of parcels to the following named postoffices in Alaska: Nome, St. Michael, Circle, Eagle, Fort Yukon, Rampart, Tanana, Teller and Umanak.

NEWS OF OREGON

ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM ALL PARTS OF THE STATE.

Commercial and Financial Happenings of the Past Week—Brief Review of the Growth and Development of Various Industries Throughout Our Commonwealth—Latest Market Report.

Twenty-seven bales of hops were sold in Salem a few days ago for 23 cents per pound.

The assessment roll of Columbia county shows the total taxable property to be worth \$1,597,840.

Oregon City schools are in a very crowded condition, the enrollment being larger than ever before.

Rain throughout the Willamette valley has delayed prune drying and it is feared may result in injury to the crop.

Large crowds attended the opening of the Eugene carnival, despite the rain. The business houses have a number of nice displays.

Ranchmen in Josephine county will be forced to use strenuous efforts to rid the county of coyotes, which are doing much damage to stock.

The Salem commercial club has taken steps to distribute 80,000 pamphlets through the East in the interest of the Willamette valley.

A free rural mail route was recommended out of Forest Grove, and there will be some delay on account of being no map of Washington county roads.

The Oregon blind school at Salem opened with 82 students, the same as last year. This institution costs the state about \$7,000 a year, or \$220 for each pupil.

The session of the Methodist conference just held in Grants Pass proved to be the best ever held in the state. Over 150 members and delegates were in attendance.

The registration at the agricultural college is much larger than last year. Both dormitories are full and every available private boarding house in town is taxed to its utmost.

Reports show that the Indian school at Chemawa leads all others in the Northwest. While the attendance at the other institutions is falling off, that school shows a marked increase.

A movement has been started in Albany to print 75,000 pamphlets for advertising Linn county in the Middle West.

The Salem school board has fixed the salaries of all teachers in that city, other than principals, at \$40 per month.

Fruit growers in Polk county say that the prune crop will not only be light this year, but that brown rot has attacked the Italian prunes in some sections, and that this will further decrease the yield.

Engene Horton, son of the Oregon City postmaster, has received notice that he has been selected as alternate for the first congressional district for admission to West Point, and has been ordered to report to a board of officers at Vancouver Barracks, Washington, for mental and physical examination.

The taxable value of Lake county property is \$1,599,033, an increase of \$78,486 over last year.

The district fair and carnival at Baker City, which closed last Saturday, was a very successful affair from every point of view.

With proper facilities for irrigating the land, Baker county will in time become one of the chief agricultural counties in the state. Considerable improvement along this line is already being made.

An unknown disease, baffling in its nature, is creating havoc among the sheep in some parts of Lane county especially on the prairies along Coyote creek.

Oregon's 42nd annual state fair, which closed on the 29th, was the most successful exposition in the history of the agricultural association. The fair was a success financially, but in point of exhibits, which were representative of the diversified agricultural and horticultural interests of the state. Enough money was made to pay for the new buildings and improvements.

SPAIN PAYS HER DEBTS.

United States Receives Money for Distribution on an Old Claim.

Washington, Sept. 27.—The treasury department has begun distribution of \$28,500, the sum received from the government of Spain as one of the annual payments of indemnity due under the treaty of 1833. The continuation of these payments is regarded as a marked evidence of the high sense of honor cherished by the Spanish people in meeting an obligation.

About 1818 some American merchant ships were seized and destroyed by Spanish naval vessels, and when the matter was brought before a tribunal, an award was made in favor of the United States citizens for the amount of their losses. The award was converted by a curious Spanish method into perpetual rents, and the Spanish government has met the interest on these with great regularity ever since the treaty of 1833.

By a rule of international law, war absolutely extinguishes treaties previously existing between the principals; but the Spanish government did not regard itself as thus relieved by its recent war with the United States, and the only discomfort to which the script holders were subjected was in a slight deferment of two payments during the war.

NAVY IN WEST INDIES.

Gathering in Early on Account of South American Troubles.

Washington, Sept. 27.—A squadron of the North Atlantic fleet is to rendezvous in the Caribbean sea a good while before the appointed time for the assembly of the vessels for the North and South Atlantic and European stations. It is said at the navy department that the big cruiser Olympia, the flagship of Rear Admiral Coghlan, will be ready and at that officer's disposal by October 20. The cruiser San Francisco now on her way to the West Indies, and there are already in these waters the Cincinnati, the Montgomery, the Marietta and the Panther. Besides these vessels the navy department intends to attach to Admiral Coghlan's squadron the protected cruiser Raleigh, the unprotected cruiser Detroit and the gunboat Machias. The navy department has two objects in view in this early dispatch of war vessels to the Caribbean, namely, preliminary work in regard to the maneuvers and the disturbed situation. 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
