REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

WILL HAVE A MAJORITY OF 26 IN NEXT CONGRESS.

Odell Carries New York By a Decreased Majority--and Arkansas went Democratic.

The election Tuesday resulted in a victory for the republican party. The estimates are for the next congress, 206 republicans and 180 democrats. The republicans have gained largely in the western states but have lost some in the east. Governor Odell of New York who won the state by 110,000 in 1900, only carried it this election by about 10,000. Rifehall, who was nominated by the republicans to succeed Speaker D. B. Henderson, was elected by about 5000 majority and the republicans carried the state by about 75,000. In Nebraska the republicans have won all except perhaps the governor and two congressmen.
