Washington, Nov. 13 .- President Baer, of the Philadelphia & Reading coat and iron company, has filed with the anthracite coal strike commission the reply of that company to the statement made by John Mitchell, president of the Mineworkers of America, oncerning the points involved in the anthracite coal strike. 
