Much of the pioneer religious work of the county was due to the efforts of Mr. Wallace, who has ever been one of the stalwarts in building up the early church work, and even now, seldom ever misses one of his appointments on account of ill health or the inclemency of the weather.

Rev. C. H. Wallace was born Sept. 3, 1831 in Platte county, Mo. Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Wallace—nee Veatch was born Sept. 14, 1834 in White county, Illinois.

We join the many friends and relatives of this couple, who have passed the fiftieth mile post in life's journey, in wishing them more pleasant "wedding anniversaries."

Special School Election.

The result of the special school election held in the city Wednesday was very gratifying to the progressive element of our city inasmuch as it resulted in the voting of the special tax levy for the equipment of the extra room and the hiring of an extra teacher which was made necessary by the wonderfully increased attendance this year over that of any previous year.
